They re not responsible for what the N. Power Co. may or may not have one' previous to 1923 and they purhased the controlling interest in this ompany because they had faith in he future of this city and the fairindedness of the majority of its peo-

With the first of March the plant apacity of the New Brunswick Powr Co. was increased by about 50 per cent, under the terms of a contract between the power company and the St. John Drydock and Shipbuilding Co., Ltd By this contract the N. B. Power Co. has leased the power plant at the drydock site which is capable f generating about 3,000 h.p. for a term of three years. It will be connected up with the city plant of the company, which has a capacity of about 6,000 h.p. Under the terms of the new arrangement the power company is given the right to operate the plant either for the purpose of supplying current for the dock and its allied activities or ordinary purposes The company will continue to supply the drydock with power and the plant at the dock will serve for auxiliary purposes in carrying peak loads. The power plant at the dock is oil burning and can therefore be called upon at short notice to meet unusual

The company has placed orders for about \$75,000 worth of new squipment for its gas department as part of a program for improvement and expansion which will involve a total investment of more than \$700,000.




