

North Sydney Hears Report

THAT F. T. NOTABERT MAY SUCCEED WOLVIN.

Visitor from Ottawa States That Tie-Up of Coal Industry May Cause Flare-up and Reorganization—Present Head Not Popular.

NORTH SYDNEY, May 27.—That there is feelings of great dissatisfaction and uneasiness among the ranks of certain people closely allied with the Besco Corporation in Ottawa and Montreal is the opinion of a gentleman who came here from Ottawa, and who is in close touch with the above concern. Speaking yesterday to our correspondent he said that the great loss to the company incurred by the present tie-up of the coal industry in Cape Breton was causing all kinds of talk, not the least of which is a well-founded rumor that the present head of Besco is not to resign much longer. "It would not surprise me in the least," said the gentleman from the capital, "if Mr. Wolvin was soon succeeded as head of Besco by F. T. Notabert, M.E., who was at one time general manager of the Acadia Coal Company."

At present Mr. Notabert is manager of a large steel and coal company in England, and his return here as manager of all mining operations of the British Empire Steel Corporation would be hailed with delight by all classes of people, especially those in the coal mining industry. He is well known among mining men of Nova Scotia and is looked upon as a most efficient and capable official.—Sydney Post.

INVERNESS MAN SAILS FOR CANADA.

An interesting personality sailing from Glasgow last week on board the Anchor-Donaldson liner, Athenia, which is bound for Canada, was Mr. John Macpherson, of Newmarket, Inverness. The name recalls three generations of champion pipers who have succeeded one another as piper to the late Cluny Macpherson, Cluny Castle, Inverness.

Mr. Macpherson carried off the championships in Oban in 1914 and Inverness in 1921. His father, Malcolm, was once the world's champion piper a distinction he earned at the Edinburgh Exhibition in 1886. Mr. Gerard Crane, formerly of Yorkshire, and now of Cochrane, Alberta, a well-known horse breeder, sailed from Glasgow to Canada on the Canadian-Pacific liner Metagama with two famous racehorses. The horses are to be used to improve the breed of hunters and polo ponies in Western Canada.


BEWARE THE DEADLY DETAIL.
