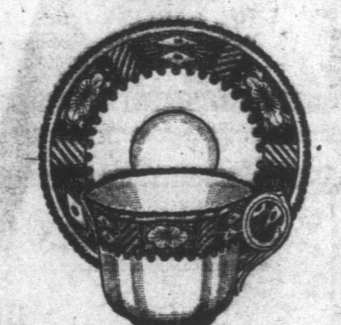

LAST NIGHTS CONCERT AND RACING EVENTS.

Upwards of twelve hundred spectators were present at the Prince of Wales Club last night, at the Promenade Band Concert, under the direction of the C.L.B. and C.G.C. Bands, besides taking in, what proved to be a very interesting sporting attraction, the 3-mile race and 1-mile walk. Judging by the large numbers in attendance last night these band concerts are without doubt increasing in popularity and a source of great pleasure to the public. The music as rendered by both bands was of a very high order, and it certainly augurs well for future entertainments of its kind. A striking feature in connection with last night's musical programme was the playing of the march, "Striking Fire," by the massed bands. The dance numbers met with the popular approval of all, and large numbers took advantage of the music to dance on the roof of the spacious arena. There was not a single hitch or one dull moment throughout, the music being almost continuous and greatly enjoyed by all those present. A great meed of praise is due the band conductors for their untiring efforts in this respect. At nine o'clock the sports side of the programme commenced, with Mr. Tobin in charge of the course. This first was a three-mile race in which four competitors took part, viz: C. Stone, W. Linegar, J. Johnston and W. Woodley. At the crack of the pistol, all four runners got away together, with Linegar in the lead. On the third lap C. Stone moved up into second place and gave Linegar a merry chase around the course for fourteen laps, when he put on a spurt and shot to the front. Stone, running without any apparent effort, gradually increased his lead on Linegar, and crossed over the second mile with half a lap to the good. J. Johnston was running in third place at this point, two laps to the rear, with Woodley sprinting at intervals to keep up with the last named runner. There was no change in the runners' positions in the last mile, although Stone increased his lead on Linegar to a full lap on the 42nd round. When the bell went, three laps from the finish, Stone opened up at a fast pace and passed the second runner. He circled the track in splendid form and crossed over the 10.2 1-5 seconds. Linegar finished strong in 1-3 seconds, while Johnston and Woodley also finished

the course in the order named. The race was very exciting throughout; all the runners received a well deserved ovation from the crowd.

Exciting Walking Contest.
The 1-mile walk, between G. Burrell and T. Piercey, proved to be one of the best exhibitions of walking seen in the city for some time. Burrell took the lead for the first lap, when Piercey passed him. The latter increased his lead steadily as the race progressed and at the 3-4 mile mark fully 15 yards separated them. In the final lap Burrell put on a pretty burst of speed and gradually cut down his opponent's lead, but lost out the finish by a scant 3 feet. Piercey was acclaimed the victor in the record time of 7 min. 49 sec., beating his previous indoor record by 7 2-5 seconds.

The presentation of cups and medals then took place, followed by a continuation of the musical programme. The Bands express their sincere thanks to the following officials:—J. Tobin, Captain of the Course; S. P. Cullen, Starter; C. Hall, J. M. Tobin, Timekeepers; P. J. Grace, A. H. Thomas, J. J. Bates, G. Halley, B. Chata and J. Bell, Judges. Also to the donors of the prizes: Messrs. G. Marshall, J. M. Tobin, H. C. Hayward and T. J. Bennett.

Two more joint concerts will be held before the rink is taken over for the Exhibition; these will be held on Monday and Friday evenings. For the latter, special arrangements are being made and it will take the form of a grand carnival dance. Special prizes will be offered for the most pretty and original costumes, particulars of which will be announced as soon as they are finalized.

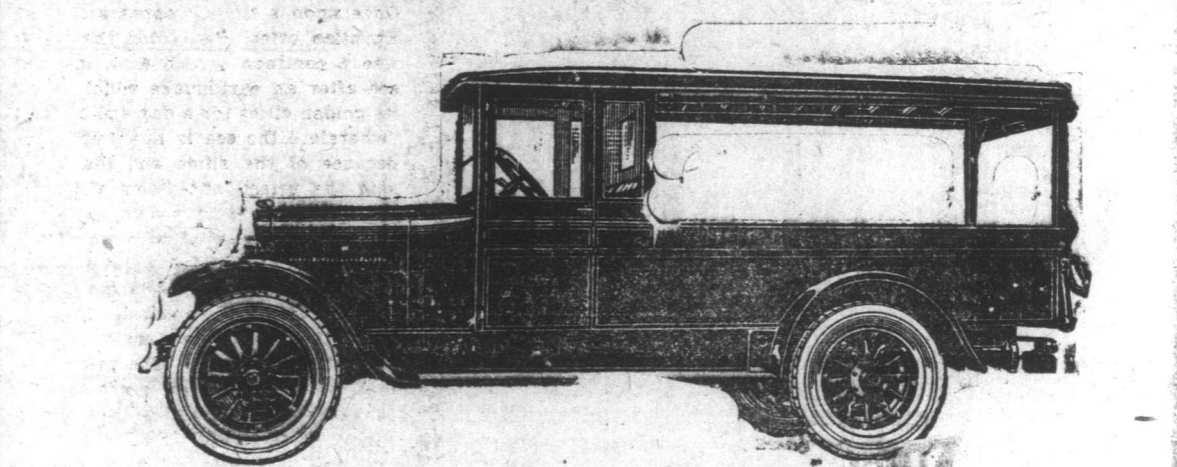
