BIG TIME IN AYLMER ON DOMINION DAY

Band, Firemen, Returned Soldiers, Fenian Raid Veterans, Cadets, Rural School Pupils and Prominent Canadian Speakers to Help Celebrate 50th Anniversary of Confederation.

Many Prizes to be Given—Something Doing Morning Afternoon and Evening.

At a meeting of the committee to arrange for a big celebration in Aylmer on Dominion Day, to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Confederation, preliminary steps were taken to insure a big day's entertainment. It is hoped that every citizen will take an active interest and help have one of the old time celebrations, for which Aylmer was famous. Decorate your homes and grounds and make Aylmer look her best.

The details of the programme are not yet definitely worked out, but the day will commence with a monster parade at 10 o'clock a.m., headed by the Citizen's Band. In the parade will be our returned soldiers, the veterans of '66, and the veterans of No. 3 Company of which Mayor Wright was commanding officer, the cadets, the Aylmer Fire Company, rural school pupils, decorated autos, etc. The Fire Company will also give an exhibition during the morning.

In the afternoon a Band Concert will be given by the Citizen's Band, it is expected that Judge Barons, of Stratford, will give a patriotic address, and orations by public school and high school pupils on either "Confederation" or some other patriotic topic, and other interesting events, details of which will be given later.

Arrangements are being made to provide a splendid patriotic concert in the evening, at the Town Hall, in which local talent will take part.

The day will be purely a patriotic one, and one long to be remembered.
