A. K. H. B.'s Latest Reminiscences.

"Long ago, when Dr. Blair was minister of the High Kirk of Edinburgh, he had cut the most cultivated congregation in Scotland. It is the fashion now to run Blair down. But he had his day. And even Samuel Johnson, bitter against Presbyterianism, declared that Blair's sermon on Cornelius, a devout man, was the best he ever read. Once an extremely homely old Highland minister came to Edinburgh, and Dr. Blair, somehow, had to ask him to preach. The congregation never forgave his sermon. Neither did Dr. Blair. There was a crowd of all the refinement of the Scottish metropolises, and there was the elegant Dr. Blair himself.
