EIGHTEEN DEATHS FROM SUN-STROKE.

Berlin, Aug. 3.-There was fierce sunshine in many parts of Prussia last week, and a large number of workmen have been prostrated by the heat. At Koenigsburg on Thursday the heat was so great that eighteen persons who were prostrated have since died from the effects.

A NATIONAL GUEST. London, Aug. 3 .- Li Hung Chang, the Chinese diplomat, who attended the coronation ceremonies of Czar Nicholas II., as Moscow, as special envoy of the Chinese Government, and who has since visited Berlin and Paris, arrived in London Sunday evening.
