MONTREAL Sept. 21.—At the Montreal stock yards, Point St. Charles, there were offered 14 cars of cattle, 400 hogs and 500 sheep and lambs. Prices were the same as last week. No cattle were sold for export. There were about 650 head of butterer cattle, 100 calves and 3,500 sheep and lambs offered at the East End Abattoir to-day. The usually large supplies, especially of mutton critters, had a demoralizing effect on the market, and though the butchers were out in large numbers sales were slow and prices very uncertain. There were no really good beeves on the market to-day and the best cattle could be got for about \$t c per lb, and some of the leaner animals at about 2c per lb, and the probabilities are that a good many head will have to be held over for another market. There was a brisk demand for calves, though rivies were rather easier, ranging from \$3 to 26 for common veals and from \$7 to \$13 50 or good ones.
