> THE CULTIVATION AND PREPAR-ATION OF BLACK TEA.

In China and Japan tea is mostly cultivated in small patches by the pea-santry, who gather the leaves, and prepare the tea in their huts, in a very unfastidious manner. In Ceylon the cultivation and manufacture of tea is very different, and it may be interesting to give a brief account of how good tea is made:

The tea bushes are planted in lines, at regular distances, in drained land, which is regularly weeded. Every year height of about two feet, and eight weeks after the pruning, the first "flush" of new leaf is plucked, and the "flushes" re-occur every ten days. Coolies, with a basket attached to their girpluck the bud, and a couple of tender leaves. Twice a day the leaf is weighed and taken into the factory, where it is at once spread very thinly on trays to wither. The withered leaf is then placed in the rolling machine, and in about an hour it has become a moist mass of twisted leaves, technically called the "roll." It is then placed in trays to ferment, during which process it changes from a green to a copper color. The strength and flaof the tea depend to a great extent on the fermentation (and the careful treatment of "SALADA" Ceylon Teas during the fermentation is the chief reason they excel all others). 
