March 6.

Judgment Will Be Given in the Election Trial Then.

Decision to be Made at Osgoode Hall, Toronto.

Important Documentary Evidence on the Carty Case

Found Too Late to be Used by Mr. Osler.

Some 900 Charges Have Not Been Touched.

Mr. Aylesworth Anxious About the Costs.

Mr. Beattie Finds a Letter-But He Did Not Produce It When Subpoenaed To Do So-Closing Scenes of the Great Trial.

The election trial, so far as London is concerned, came to a close at 3:30 o'clock. The crowd was perhaps as large as at any other time during the case. Every seat was taken and the aisles were choked with people. The audience relished Mr. Osler's spirited cross-examination of Mr. Beattie, the respondent, and the latter's discomfiture. The judges will, if time permits, give their decision on March 6, at 11 o'clock, at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. They have a hundred charges to consider, the attic and Detroit groups forming the majority. And 900 charges made by the petitioner are still untouched! The court could have sat for weeks unearthing the remaining mass of corruption. The trial has been the longest in the annals of Canadian jurisprudence - 21 days. However, compared with the impeachment of Warren Hastings, Jarndyce vs. Jarndyce, and other British cases, it is a very small affair. The court reporter, Mr. Nelson Butcher, has a mass of shorthand in his carpet bag that would simply afford a less energetic and efficient interpreter of the late lamented Pittman's pothooks and polygrams. He has taken down over 1,000,000 words since the trial began.

one continuous hard grind while the court was sitting, with scarcely a moment's cessation. Mr. Butcher dictates much of his matter to a phonograph, and a phonograph repeats it to a typewriter girl. He runs the risk of a sore throat. With all its prolixity the trial has been vastly entertaining, and at hardly any stage was the court room dull. The soft cushioned chairs in the jury box were in great demand, and seemed to come into the permanent possession of two score venerable gentlemen, each of whom has been seen in identically the same spot every day, as if he struck a root into it. They acquired a prescriptive right to these seats, and were highly indignant if they found them usurped by earlier birds. Many brought their gimlets to court, and so assured themselves of positions in the front row. If the constables had allowed it some of them might have brought stretchers, and spent the night there. They came to be known as the jurors among the other court attendants. At the conclusion of the case would have long ago if their verdict had had legal effect. Even the judges could have followed them, and been more closely than they, and when the sonorous tones of High Constable Wilson proclaimed the verdict, they cast one "longing, lingering look behind," as if loth to quit the scene of so many pleasant hours, enlivened by the constant dropping of the railway companies would run a special excursion train to Toronto when the courts crop up, and perhaps they might do a good stroke of business.

Judges, Mr. Osler, Mr. Aylesworth, the registrar, and the court reporter, all left for Toronto on the 4:30 train. Their lordships have now a little spare time to sift the evidence, and will no doubt tackle the job at once.

MR. BEATTIE IN THE BOX. When The Advertiser's report, broke off yesterday it was in the midst of Mr. Beattie's examination, just after his admission about his "loan" to William Pettie. He had just brought the witness box a hot box.

Witness, continuing, said he knew that Pettie was promising a job for his work, but he did not know whether he got it or not.

Witness also said he got a letter from E. J. Carty, asking witness to secure him a position. He had not the letter now, but he had shown it to Mr. Helmut. Witness had found his letter after Carty had been in the box.

MR. OSLER-Why did you not produce that letter when you were subpoenaed to produce all your correspondence? You did not hunt for it, did you?

Witness looked rather confused, and said he had not hunted for this particular letter for some time, and witness could not say whether he was a member of the Conservative Association or not, as the association had no connection.

AN IMPORTANT DISCOVERY. Mr. Osler produced a letter sent to E. J. Carty and signed J. H. A. Beattie. Witness admitted the signature was that of his nephew, J. H. A. Beattie.

Mr. Aylesworth objected to the letter being read.

Mr. Osler said the letter had just been found, and was a cogent bit of evidence. He wished to read it in Mr. Beattie's cross-examination.

Judge Ferguson said the evidence in the Carty case was closed.

Mr. Osler then asked that the Carty case be reopened, as he had discovered this written document just three minutes ago. He wished to apply the document in cross-examination of the witness.

Mr. Aylesworth again objected, as he had had no intimation of the document, and was not prepared to meet it. The judges declined to reopen the Carty case and admit the letter.

The letter in question informed Mr. Carty, who was then in Detroit, that an agent of Mr. Beattie would call upon him at an early date, and asked him to be sure to be in London on election day.

This letter, had it been found in time, would have had an important bearing upon the Carty-Graydon case.

EVIDENCE CLOSED. Mr. Aylesworth said that the evidence was concluded, and he and Mr. Osler concurred in the view that argument on the nineteenth section should be deferred until decision on the other charges had been given.

Mr. Osler pointed out that the Supreme Court had given a decision on the 19th section in a few weeks. He would say a copy of the argument, and, if possible, of the judgment, before the longships.

Judge Ferguson said he would like to get it, not for information, but because he would be bound by the Supreme Court's decision.

After some further discussion by counsel, Judge Ferguson remarked: "I don't know but that the business of the whole country from the Ottawa to the St. Clair will have to be suspended for the London election trial." (Laughter.)

Their lordships retired for consultation, and returning Judge Ferguson said it was not quite decided that counsel were entitled to argue at the 19th section, but he saw no harm in it beyond the inconvenience in adopting the course desired by both counsel.

Mr. Osler-We will have to make the argument short after that. Judge Ferguson-It will likely be very long. (Laughter.) Judge Robertson said he would like to hear the argument on the 19th section now, but he yielded to Judge Ferguson.

JUDGMENT ON MARCH 6. Judge Ferguson then announced that the court would stand adjourned till March 6 for judgment, by consent of both parties. If the judges were not then ready notice would be given of a further adjournment.

Judge Robertson-Seeing the amount of work before us, we are unable to say whether we will be ready by that time or not.

Suddenly Summoned.

An Evangelist's Wife Expires in Church.

Castlemary, an Opera Singer, Falls Dead Before the Footlights in a New York Theatre-Sudden Death in Hamilton.

Pellately, O., Feb. 11.-Mrs. William I. Fee, the aged wife of Rev. William I. Fee, dropped dead on Sunday night in the Methodist Church. She sang and prayed as she came out before the congregation, she said: "I hope I may never meet any whom I see before me in this church again. It is my prayer that our next meeting place be in heaven."

At the conclusion of these words her frail body swayed, and her figure fell lifeless to the floor of the pulpit, before anyone could catch her. Women screamed and children cried at the sight of the white-haired evangelist who lay dead before them. It is believed by many to be a visitation. New York, Feb. 11.-At the conclusion of the final scene of the opera of "Martha," at the Metropolitan Opera House last night, the Metropolitan Opera House, which took the part of Tristane, reeled, and before assistance could be procured he fell dead. Heart disease was the cause.

The opera house was crowded to hear the production of Flotow's famous opera. All had gone well during the performance, and Castlemary, by his superb acting and wonderful singing, had drawn forth round after round of applause. People who had been attending the grand opera for many seasons past were forcibly struck by Castlemary's magnificent work last night. At times his acting really surprised anything that had ever been seen on the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House. At the close of the final scene, Castlemary reeled and fell. His superhuman effort he recovered himself and rushed in among the crowd of chorus girls, who surrounded him. He grasped a table and supported himself until the curtain fell. As the curtain went down, Castlemary, unable to stand the strain any longer, gave way and fell to the stage. The first to reach the dying man was Jean De Reszka. Reclining in his friend's arms, Castlemary, without uttering a word, breathed his last.

Hamilton, Feb. 11.-Tuesday evening, while Mrs. Stephen Williams, of the Mountain Top, was sitting in her parlour, entertaining Rev. S. Bennetts and his wife, she was taken suddenly ill, complaining of a choking sensation. Dr. Ferguson was at once sent for, but in two or three minutes Mrs. Williams was dead. She had not been ill for some time, and her heart trouble brought on the sudden collapse. Deceased was 48 years old, and leaves a husband, but no family.

Thamesville, Feb. 11.-Christopher Fox, one of the oldest residents of Thamesville, and at one time a prominent business man of the village, died suddenly on Tuesday, while seated at his table, enjoying the evening meal. The only other occupant of the house at the time was his son, a boy of 19 years.

Crete and Greece.

Prince George Ordered to Prevent the Landing of Turkish Troops.

Athens, Feb. 11.-The dispatch of the torpedo flotilla, commanded by Prince George of Greece, for the island of Crete, has caused the greatest enthusiasm among the populace. It is said that the Prince has orders to prevent the landing of any Turkish troops on that island.

The fighting at Kissamo, where the Mohammedan inhabitants were besieged in their houses for several days, was desperate.

Thirty Christians and 100 Mohammedans were killed, and fighting, it is reported, is still proceeding about the convent of Christopoli, near Candia. The insurgent leaders have now assembled for a conference, and it is understood that a constitution and a provisional government will shortly be promulgated.

It is asserted that M. Dimitroff, the Bulgarian diplomatic agent, has been entrusted with a specific mission to negotiate an agreement between Bulgaria and Greece for combined action in Macedonia.

London, Feb. 11.-A dispatch to the Times from Athens says that the central Cretan committee is preparing to support the Cretans with arms, ammunition and supplies on a great scale. The first instalment, it is added, sailed on Wednesday with 500 armed Cretans. The dispatch concludes with the remark: "It is possible that a direct collision will occur between the Greek and Turkish forces."

Twenty Drowned!

By the Loss of the British Steamer Cayanus.

Glasgow, Feb. 11.-It is now stated that 20 members of the crew of the British steamer Cayanus were drowned in the wreck of that vessel near Ushant, France.

The Cayanus was bound from Bilbao to this port.
