Milan, May 20.-According to advices received by the Secolo from Moscow the coronation festivities have caused renewed activity among the Nihilists, who for a long time past appeared to have abandoned their attempts upon the life of the ruler of Russia. The advices published by the paper are to the effect that the police of Moscow have discovered a place in the city that was used for the manufacture of bombs. It was located beneath the street through which the coronation procession will pass. It is added that placards have been posted about the streets calling upon the people to revolt against the Czar. THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY

### Officially Colebrated in Great Britain-Parade of the Horse Guards.

London, May 20.-The official celebration of the Queen's Birthday, which occurs on Sunday, took place today, throughout the country and the empire in general. On the parade ground of the Horse Guards there was the usual attractive ceremony of trooping the colors, and it was witnessed by a large crowd of distinguished people, including the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, Prince and Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, the Duke of Cambridge, Prince Charles of Denmark, and the Commander-in-Chief, Lord Wolseley. Her Majesty was born May 24, 1819. It is said that an undignified squabble arose this year between Lord Wolseley and the Duke of Cambridge about the function of trooping the colors. The latter, as ex-Commander-in-Chief, and Prince of the blood royal, claimed precedence over his successor, but met with a positive, obstinate refusal, and a deadlock was avoided only by the Prince of Wales stepping in and asserting his right as heir apparent to outrank both. Wolseley made the best of a bad bargain and withdrew his claims and Cambridge had to follow

EMBARGO ON TOBACCO. Tampa, Fla., May 20.—Gen.
