CALES IN BRITAIN.

London, May 20.—Violent gales have prevailed all along the coasts, and the shipping at Hull has suffered considerably. A large vessel was driven ashore near Port Patrick, Scotland, this morning. It is stated there has been great loss of life.

DEATH OF A NOTED DOG.

Berlin, May 20.—Prince Bismarck's famous hound, Tyras II., died at Friedrichsruhe yesterday from old age. He succeeded the historic Tyras, the dog which attained great notoriety through his assistance to his master at the time of the Berlin Congress.

FROM RHODES.

London, May 20.—A dispatch to the Times from Cape Town says that Mr. Cecil Rhodes telegraphed there that if he gets a junction with Capt. Napier the rebellion will be broken. He says that there are 4,000 natives between the Shangani River, Bombest and Dabas, Indiana.

BAD FOR THE TRANSVAAL.

Johannesburg, May 20.—The mining and industrial outlook here is very bad, owing to indecision on the part of the Transvaal Government in fixing the penalties to be imposed upon the reform committee prisoners. Barotsa has threatened his threatened sale of his mining and other property, pending political developments.

A TANGIBLE SALUTE.

London, May 20.—The mayor of Southampton, accompanied by a number of municipal officers and others, yesterday visited the United States training ship Essex. After the party had left for the shore in a launch, the salute was fired by the Essex. Some pellets of burning powder somewhat severely injured the mayor and grazed others in the launch.

THE MISSION OUTRAGE.

Shanghai, May 20.—Details received in regard to the anti-missionary riots at Kiang-Yin, on May 12, during which a mission was looted, show that the disturbance was caused by the admission of a native child to the mission school. The child, a son of a man who had been expelled from the school, was admitted to the school, and the missionaries, who were angry at the admission, attacked the child and the school. A CHOLERA MIASMA.

London, May 20.—The Standard publishes a dispatch from Cairo saying that cholera miasma similar to that of 1883 overhangs the city. It is said that the miasma is a result of the atmosphere. The virulent form of the disease has hardly been paralleled at such an early stage. The deaths are about one per cent of the population. There were two cases and one death on Tuesday among the troops at Taurah. This has caused much anxiety, inasmuch as the 1,200 convicts in prison at that place.

IN A MUDDLE.

Rome, May 20.—The party of the Extreme Left in the Chamber of Deputies, holding that Gen. Baldissera, late commander-in-chief of the Italian forces in Abyssinia, was a traitor, have decided to propose to the Chamber that the members of the late Ciriacy Ministry be arraigned before the High Court to answer for the general policy of the campaign. The Left and Extreme Left are the dominant groups in the Chamber. A committee of nine Left and Extreme Left deputies has been appointed to formulate charges and specifications against the late Cabinet.

TROUBLE AT CRETE.

London, May 20.—The troubles between the Christians and Turks on the Island of Crete continue. On Sunday a Turkish soldier killed a Christian Greek at Vamou. The killing caused the deepest indignation among the Christian populace, and arming themselves with all manner of weapons they blocked the main highway to the town. The Turks feared to make a sortie, and telegraphed to Canea for reinforcements. A steamer arrived at Vamou, having on board 400 troops, to aid the Turkish garrison. They were not able to land, however, strong armed hands on the shore threatening to fire upon them if an attempt was made to do so. A few rounds were fired from the steamer, after which she departed. The garrison is still besieged.

GERMAN INTERESTS IN AFRICA.

Berlin, May 20.—During the debate in the Reichstag on the credits asked for Damaraland, German Southwest Africa, Dr. Kaiser, chief of the Colonial Office, declared that in the opinion of the Government, Germany should never abandon her possessions in Southwest Africa, and expressed the hope that reinforcements of 400 troops would be sent there by the end of the month. Dr. Kaiser denied, during the course of this debate, that Germany's action was intended to aid the British, saying that it was intended to maintain German rule there, and was of general political importance.

THE CONCLUSION OF THE DEBATE,

during which Herr Richter and others opposed the bill, the Damaraland credits passed their second and third readings.

BRITISH RADICAL MANIFESTO.

London, May 20.—A manifesto, signed by Henry Labouchere and eighteen other Radical members of the House of Commons, has been issued. It announces the formation in the House of an advanced Radical section which will devote itself to promoting Radicalism among the voters of the country, primarily centering its efforts on the abolition of the House of Lords, and generally to make Parliament a democratic body.
