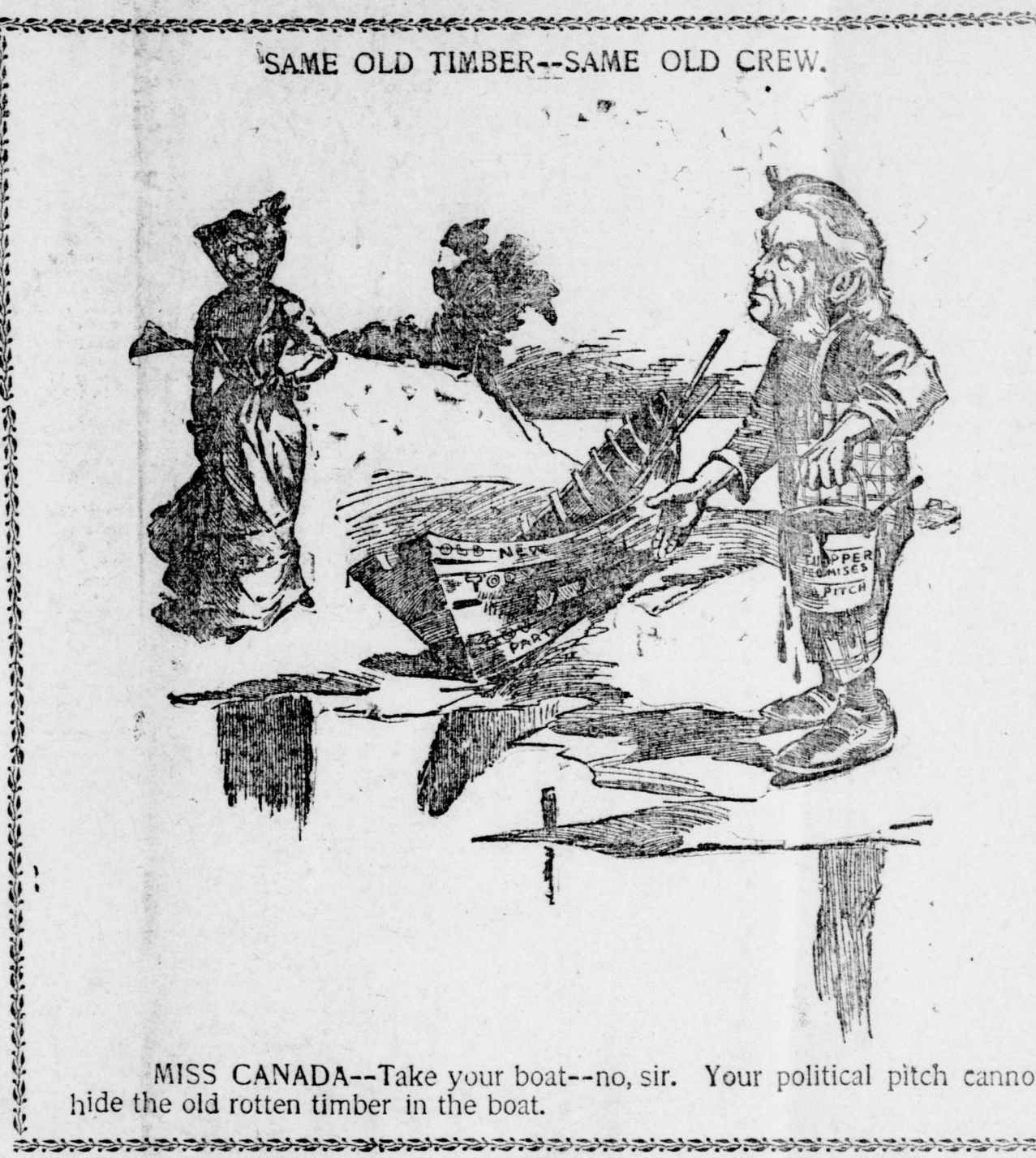

The reasons we have urged against it have been urged from time to time in Parliament, and its abolition advocated by the Reform press.

What gives point to a discussion of the gerrymander at the present time is the discussion of individual bribery at elections in this city.

The Free Press has on many occasions accused the Reform party of having carried an election in a certain riding by corrupt means.

The gerrymander act is an act of usurpation. It strikes below the belt. It is cowardly and dishonest.

The Reform party, on the other hand, has always legislated in favor of fair elections, and so far as they could have made it difficult to do wrong.

Is it not plain, therefore, that there is a vast difference between an individual act of corruption and one by the rulers of the nation?

The act of the Government corrupts the public conscience and degrades public life.

It is not wonder that its leaders fell out among themselves. The country now has an opportunity to let them carry out in opposition, and reflect on the result to the country and to themselves.
