Further Proceedings of the
Conferences.

Closing Sessions of the London
Organization.

Ridgetown the Next Place of Meeting—
Final Changes in Stations—Doings
of the Guelph and Niagara
Conferences.

TUESDAY MORNING SESSION.

SARNIA, June 6.—Conference met again
at 9 a.m., Rev. Dr. Aylesworth presiding.
The devotional exercises were conducted
by Rev. H. W. Locke.

The first business of the day was reading
the report of the superannuation fund com-
mittee, which provoked considerable dis-
cussion, recommending that a minister
receiving a salary of \$800 shall pay \$12
into the fund, and those receiving over that
amount an additional 2 per cent.

Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., presented the
report of the examining board, which was
accepted. Rev. J. G. Scott, having been
transferred to the Guelph Conference, Rev.
J. W. Annis was appointed secretary of
that board.

Resolutions of thanks were passed to
Rev. Dr. Potts for the excellent sermon on
Sabbath morning, and also to Messrs. J.
F. Lister, M.P., and C. Mackenzie, M.P.P.,
for their kindness in giving the members of
the Conference and their friends a sail up
the river on the steamer "Hiawatha."

Rev. R. J. Treleven presented the re-
port of the Woman's Missionary Society.
A resolution expressing appreciation of the
work being done, was adopted by the Con-
ference.

It was resolved that the next Conference
be held in the town of Ridgetown the first
Thursday in June, 1894.

Rev. Mr. McLaurin, Baptist minister of
Sarnia, and Rev. W. H. Moore, of Michi-
gan, were introduced to the Conference.

Rev. J. Philip, B.D., Conference treasurer
of the superannuation fund, reported a
surplus of \$13 41 in this fund.

Rev. H. W. Locke read the report of the
committee on Sabbath observance, which
strongly disapproved the running of
Sunday trains, boats, etc., Sunday visiting,
funerals and parades, and recommended
the closing of places of business at an early
hour on Saturday evenings.

The Epworth League report was pre-
sented and adopted. It recommended that
district associations be formed and a dis-
trict secretary be appointed.

A resolution of thanks to the pastors and
people of Sarnia for their kindness in pro-
viding homes for the delegates during
Conference was heartily passed. Confer-
ence adjourned at 12 o'clock.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION.

In the absence of the president, who was
attending a meeting of the stationing com-
mittee, Rev. W. McDonagh was in the
chair. Devotional exercises were conducted
by Rev. J. E. Moore.

Rev. J. Ford, LL.B., presented the
report of the educational committee, recom-
mending: 1. That C. B. Keenleyside, B.A.,
and W. B. Creighton, B.A., be permitted
to attend college for the purpose of pursu-
ing a post-graduate course of study, 2.

That G. A. Isen, J. A. Ayscote, John
Haid and J. A. Snell be appointed to
Victoria College and L. W. Reid to attend
Montreal. Rev. J. Ford, LL.B., was
appointed secretary-treasurer.

The following were appointed Confer-
ence treasurers for the connexional
funds: General Conference, R. C.
Parsons; contingent, J. Leary; union
church relief, A. G. Harris; super-
annuation, J. Philip, B.D.; educational, W.
J. Ford, LL.B.; sustentation, J. E.
Gundy; missionary, B. Clement; Sunday
school aid, R. Millyard.

Rev. Dr. Antill was elected to fill the
vacancy in the General Conference dele-
gation occasioned by the death of Rev. G.
Lloyd. Rev. Dr. Aylesworth was elected
representative on the general board of
missions.

Rev. D. E. Martin was presented with a
purse of \$30 by members of the Conference
for his services as postmaster.

The secretary of the stationing com-
mittee read the final draft of stations. The

A very strong resolution was passed
condemning the Anglo-Indian Government
in fostering state regulation of vice, the
opium trade and the drink traffic. The
Conference then closed its sessions.

Guelph Conference.

OWEN SOUND, June 6.—After the opening
of Conference yesterday afternoon greet-
ings were extended to London and Bay of
Quinte. From the report of the committee
on state of work it was learned that the
increase in membership for the past year
is over 900. The report advocated strongly
the doing away with the old-time tea-
meeting and the giving of voluntary con-
tributions, followed by free social.

In the ministerial session at the close
of the Conference the application of Rev. Mr.
Mahood to enter the Guelph Conference
was rejected, owing to the Conference being
more than full, and H. E. Kellington was
received as a probationer for the ministry.

The Niagara Conference.

St. Catharines, June 6.—The Niagara
Methodist Conference yesterday received

telegrams containing fraternal greetings
from the Montreal, Bay of Quinte and Lon-
don Conferences. Appropriate replies were
sent.

Rev. W. Kettlewell asked that the presi-
dent give his ruling whether a suspended
minister of the church should be permitted
to dispense the Sacrament of the Lord's
Supper during his period of suspension.

The president answered: "The chair
declines to give a ruling on this question in
the absence of a case; if it is expedient for
a decision to be given from the chair, the
chair hereby gives it as its opinion that the
suspension of a minister deprives him from
the exercise of all ministerial acts and
more especially those referred to in section
69 of the discipline, viz., from conducting
divine worship and administering baptism
and the Lord's Supper in any Methodist
church."

Rev. Dr. Burns made a plea in favor of a
minister suddenly suspended. He urged
that the fact that he was suddenly cut off
from his ordinary means of livelihood
should be considered. The president said
that he did not know what suspension
meant unless it was that he was to be pre-
vented from spreading doctrines which the
church did not approve from Methodist
pulpits.

Rev. G. W. Kerby presented his special
report in regard to raising \$6,000 to pay off
the floating liability on Dundas Street
Methodist Church, Woodstock. There was
a floating liability previous to the meeting
of the last Conference of \$8,159. The mem-
bers of Conference subscribed \$2,267 at the
time the resolution was passed, leaving
about \$6,000 for Mr. Kerby to raise. Mr.
Kerby raised \$7,000, of which \$6,423 has
been paid. The report was received and
adopted and a vote of thanks passed to Mr.
Kerby.

A sweeping resolution condemnatory of
the teachings of the Canada Holiness As-
sociation and the doctrines disseminated
by it was introduced by Rev. J. S. Wilkin-
son, seconded by Rev. John Kay. The
resolution began with a sympathetic allu-
sion to the position in which Rev. Mr.
Truax was placed by his having become an
exponent of the doctrines of this associa-
tion.

Among others Rev. Dr. Sutherland spoke
against stirring up trouble with such a
wide and ill-considered motion, and he moved
that it be laid on the table. The motion to
lay it on the table was lost by 62 to 46, but
on Dr. Sutherland again moving that it be
referred to a committee it was adopted.

The mover, who declared himself satis-
fied with the vote, which sufficiently proved
the Conference in sympathy with such an
expression.

"Let Me Die With My Boots On."
GOVERNOR, N.Y., June 6.—Col. Henry
Palmer, a Western miner, died at the Peak
House Saturday after a sickness of twelve
hours. His last request was: "Let me die
with my boots on." He was worth \$250,-
000, and leaves a wife in San Francisco,
from whom he has been separated for
seventeen years.

Drowned at Napanee.

NAPANEE, June 6.—About 8 o'clock on
Sunday two little boys were playing on the
Rathbun Company's logs in the river, when
Reeve Rankin, son of Hugh Rankin, of the
Briscoe House, fell into the river, and the
other little fellow did not give the warning
until some time afterwards, when the boys
and others with their poles instituted a
search. They succeeded in recovering the
body about 6 o'clock. The boy was
about 6 years of age.

West Huron Liberals.

At a meeting of the Liberals of West
Huron, held to appoint delegates to the
national convention, the following resolu-
tion, moved by Mr. J. T. Garrow, M.P.P.,
and seconded by Mr. M. C. Cameron, ex-
M.P., was adopted: "That this association,
in convention assembled, desires to express
its continued confidence in our leaders,
Hon. Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Oliver
Mowat, and their firm adherence to Liberal
principles as enunciated by them, and to
assure them of its support and hearty co-
operation in winning Canada to Liber-
alism."
