FOUR HUNDRED BOATS LOST!

Results of the Heavy Storms That Swept the Coast of Northern Japan.

A Furious Gale Visits Britain—Health of King Edward—French Wheat Crop Short.

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 7.—Steamer advicees are that the coast of Kazusa, Northern Japan, has been visited by heavy gales, wrecking 400 fishing boats. Twelve boats, with total crews of 74, are missing. Heavy rains caused an overflow of the rivers at Hokkaido, washing away 600 houses and submerging many villages.

GALE IN GREAT BRITAIN.

London, Oct. 6.—A furious gale raged yesterday over Great Britain, the Channel, the North Sea and Belgium. Several fatalities on land are reported as the result of falling trees. Slight casualties are reported at sea also. There was a waterspout near Calais. Telegraphic and telephonic communication was generally interrupted.

THE KING AND QUEEN.

Dublin, Oct. 7.—The Freeman's Journal asserts that King Edward and Queen Alexandra will arrive in Dublin to attend the next Puckneshaw races, and will remain a fortnight in Ireland, visiting Lord Londonderry and the Duke of Devonshire. His majesty, however, will not go into the south of Ireland.

London, Oct. 7.—No intimation of any change in the King's condition has been received at Marlborough House, though special advicees from Aberdeen say that dispatches received from Balmoral announce that his majesty has almost completely recovered. The Court Circular does not mention the King's movements, as the weather at Balmoral is understood to be very bad.

THE EMPRESS CONDITION.

Berlin, Oct. 7.—The empress is still under the care of her physicians, and will be unable to attend several functions at which it was announced she would be present.

FRENCH WHEAT CROP SHORT.

France is disturbed at present over a deficient and inferior wheat harvest. The price of wheat already has risen in France 48 cents on every 100 kilograms (220.46 pounds), and the price of bread has advanced 1 cent on each loaf. The amount of wheat which France must have for home consumption between now and this time next year is reckoned at 317,500,000 bushels. How much of this the present harvest will supply is uncertain. Some authorities believe that the present harvest will supply the need, but that next year, unless there is a wonderful harvest, France will have to apply abroad for foodstuffs. This year's yield at but 246,000,000 bushels, leaving a deficiency to come from abroad this year of 99,500,000 bushels—about the same conditions as prevailed in 1897.

A MORMON REVIVAL.

The Mormons have begun a revival in London, and are holding proselyting meetings under the direction of Apostle Francis N. Lyman. At a concert Saturday night, Miss Emma B. Gates, a granddaughter of Brigham Young, probably the former wife of Gen. D. B. Bar, though she is married now to a man named Jackson, who has over their English, the royal family, and the royal corps. We have a mass of evidence, including a charge of rape against the man and of active assistance against the woman. Probably there will also be a charge of felony for them. The magistrate has promised to devote three clear days to the case, so volunition is the evidence. Ann Odella D. Bar is the woman who served a term on Blackwell's Island, New York, about thirteen years ago for swindling Luther C. Marshall.

IN CHINA.

Berlin, Oct. 7.—It is announced in a dispatch received here from Canton that, according to communications from the governor-general, troops have been ordered to proceed against the rebels. The local authorities have been ordered to protect the missionaries, and regulars and militia have been sent to the local capital, which was besieged by rebels.

A dispatch from Sian Fu announces that the Imperial court has ordered that Kai Teng Fu.

THE DANISH PARLIAMENT.

Copenhagen, Oct. 7.—King Christian on Saturday opened the rigsdag in the presence of the King of Greece, the Czar, Grand Duke Michael, the members of the Danish royal family and the royal corps. The King read the speech from the throne. After noting that an interval of many years had elapsed since he last personally opened the rigsdag, the King greeted the rigsdag at its opening session, he said: "In appointing the new ministry we have responded to the wish of the majority of the people by trusting the conduct of the government to men who are in possession of the confidence of the nation, and we cherish the strong hope that

DEATH RATE 220 PER WEEK.

Fifty Thousand Whites in South African Refugee Camps.

Heavy Mortality Among Children—Deaths to See Kruger.

BRITISH LOSSES IN SOUTH AFRICA.

London, Oct. 6.—An official report issued yesterday shows that the British casualties in South Africa from the beginning of the war to Sept. 30 were 545 officers and 5,825 men killed in action, and 1,529 officers and 28,032 men wounded; 255 officers and 9,171 men are classified as missing or prisoners, of whom 354 officers and 8,471 men have either been released or have escaped.

BOER ATTACK REPULSED.

Cape Town, Oct. 6.—Gen. Smith's commando, which went south toward Grahamstown some days ago, has now turned west and is being closely pursued by Col. Goringe and other British columns.

About 150 Boers, a portion of Theodor's commando, attacked Heidelberg West yesterday. Fifty of them galloped over the bridge into the main street, while the remainder fired from the roof of the hotel. The Boers withdrew after two hours' firing, leaving one man fatally wounded. They did not loot the stores.

WOUNDED WITH KEKEWICH.

Kingston, Ont., Oct. 6.—E. Walter Rathburn, Deseronto, has received a telegram that his brother-in-law, Major Blair, D.S.O., was wounded in the action in which Col. Kekewich's column was engaged the other night. The telegram said that the wound was not dangerous.

DR. LEYDS TO SEE KRUGER.

Brussels, Oct. 6.—Dr. Leyds, the European representative of the Transvaal, left here yesterday for Hilversum, where he will have a conference with Mr. Kruger.

IN REFUGEE CAMPS.

Bloemfontein, Oct. 6.—There are now 2,500 white persons in the various refugee camps here, while there are nearly 46,000 in the various camps in the Orange River Colony. These require sixteen railway trucks loaded with foodstuffs weekly. The weekly death rate averages 220, mostly from measles. Fifty per cent of the victims are children under the age of five. The trains passing north are filled with women and children returning to the Rand.

Thirteen hangers have lately taken the oath of allegiance here.

The agricultural department of the Orange free state, acting in conjunction with the military, is variously trying to take up agriculture by supplying seed and plows. Natives living near the railway from Bloemfontein to the Vaal River are taking advantage of this and plowing as progress under the protection of the military garrisoning the block-houses.

From Graaff Reinet here yesterday the Bedfordshire Regiment, which is garrisoning Sanna's Post, have lately been growing vegetables. The troops have dug up a quantity of soup plates, basins, cups and saucers.

RATS ATTACK CHILD

Cries of the Infant Brought None Too Soon.

Watertown, Ont., Oct. 7.—The other night neighbors of Mrs. Mary Martin, who resides at No. 85 Court street, heard a child crying in her house, and, knowing she was absent from home, Fred Eaton broke in the door and found Mrs. Martin's six-months-old daughter lying in a cradle screaming, and almost covered by a swarm of huge rats.

Eaton drove the rats away and called Dr. B. C. Cheeseman, who reached the house just as the mother returned. He found that the rats had gnawed the feet and legs of the child. Portions of the legs were gone, and the parts remaining were badly lacerated by the sharp teeth of the rodents.

He dressed the wounds, and the child will probably live unless blood poisoning sets in.

HEARTLESS TREATMENT OF A STUDENT.

Beloit, Wis., Oct. 6.—George F. Stockwell, a student in the preparatory department of Beloit College, was enticed from his room at the house of President Eaton at an early hour Sunday by members of the middle preparatory class.
