ALFONSO NOT

But a Young Man of Force and Decision.

HE KNOWS WHAT IS GOING ON

Has No Disposition to Give Away Decorations Where They Are Not Merited.

Paris, July 14 .- According to the Figaro's Madrid correspondent, Madrid is very well satisfied with the "debut" of the young King as ruling sovereign. He shows a firmness of character and an amount of decision which has surprised his ministers and has already led to some lively discussions at the cabinet councils,

A fortnight ago the King, who is a very early riser, left the palace on horseback at 8 o'clock in the morning, accompanied by the Prince de Austurias, and arrived unexpectedly at the artillery barracks. He ordered the trumpets to sound the assembly, had the guns horsed and led the regiment through the streets to the royal palace, where the Queen mother was awaiting his arrival.

This surprise, it appears, was not an agreeable one to the colonel of the regiment, and the matter was referred to the Minister of War.

"Has the King," is was asked, "the right to order out a regiment without warning the Captain-General of Ma-drid or the Minister of War?" The military party says no, but the pub-Mc, which cares nothing for military hierarchy, finds the affair very smart.
At the cabinet councils the King speaks very well, tries to impress his opinions on his advisers on various questions, and especially when it is a question of conferring decorations, reflects much. "You have no idea," said Conde de Romanoult, Minister of Public Instruction, to the Figaro corre-spondent, "how difficult it is to get the King to confer a distinction of any kind. It was quite unexpected, and the ministers, instead of a boy, found they had to do with a man."

At 6 o'clock on Sunday morning all Madrid was awakened by a tremendout explosion. The shock was such that in the Royal Palace doors and windows were blown in. Everybody thought that an anarchist outrage had taken place. The reason, of course, was the explosion of the Carabanchel powder magazine.

At 9 o'clock there was a cabinet council. One of the ministers began by stating: "Your Majesty, a great disaster has just taken place near Madrid." "Yes, yes," interrupted the King; "I know all about it; I have just



The Czechs are the Slavic family of nations, and number about 6,000,000 in Bohemia, Moravia and other parts of Austria. There is much bitterness between the Czechs and the Germans, and former are therefore taking a rabid part in attacking in newspapers and public addresses the Germanizing policy of Prussia. The description of Kaiser William as an escaped lunatic in a Bohemian official paper is but an illustration of the intense animosity on the part of the Czechs toward Ger-The Austrian Government may see fit to rebuke this reviling of the Berlin Kaiser, but will probably not notice it, for fear of inflaming Czechs still more, and Kaiser William, who understands the situation thoroughly, will doubtless take no offence at the inaction of his imperial friend, Francis Joseph. It is possible, however, that the Czechs may force Francis Joseph to act, for the anti-German agitation is becoming more violent

Woman Who Fell 60 Feet From Made by 20th Century Limited on the Lake Shore.

New Road From Toledo.

Chicago, Ill., July 14.—Reeling off 481 miles in 480 minutes, the "Twentieth Century Limited," on the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern road Saturday smashed records for fast running on that system and verified assertions made by officials that a sixteen-hour schedule could, if necessary, be main-tained between Chicago and New York. Forty-five miles west of Buffalo the train was two hours and twenty-eight minutes behind its schedule, and then it was that the engineers were given a clear track and ordered to make

their best time over the various divisions. The train covered the 134 miles between Brockton and Cleveland in 131 minutes. From Cleveland to Toledo the engineer pushed along at speed reaching ninety miles an hour, cover-ing the distance in 103 minutes. The run to Elkhart, Ind., 133 miles, was

covered in 115 minutes. The run into Chicago from Elkhart was slower on account of the necessity of slowing down while passing through three towns, where the speed of trains is limited by ordinance. Slowdowns were also necessary for the fourteen grade railroad crossings in Chicago. Despite these delays the 101 miles was covered in 111 minutes and the train, which was due in the city at 9:45 a.m., arrived at the Grand Central passenger station only twentyeight minutes late.

NEW RAILROAD WEST FROM TO-LEDO. Toledo, July 14.—The Toledo Raflway

and Terminal Co., which is building a belt line about the city, has incorporated the Toledo, Angola and West-ern Railway, which it is announced in the application for a charter is to be constructed from Toledo west to the Indiana state line. It is believed that the road is to be connected with the Toledo and Chicago transfer railroad, which is now in course of con-struction across the state of Indiana.
