ALFONSO NOT A PUTTY KING

But a Young Man of Force and Decision.

HE KNOWS WHAT IS GOING ON

Has No Disposition to Give Away Decorations Where They Are Not Merited.

Paris, July 14.—According to the Figaro's Madrid correspondent, Madrid is very well satisfied with the "debut" of the young King as ruling sovereign. He shows a firmness of character and an amount of decision which has surprised his ministers and has already led to some lively discussions at the cabinet councils.

A fortnight ago the King, who is a very early riser, left the palace on horseback at 8 o'clock in the morning, accompanied by the Prince de Asturias, and arrived unexpectedly at the artillery barracks. He ordered the trumpets to sound the assembly, had the guns hoisted and led the regiment through the streets to the royal palace, where the Queen mother was awaiting his arrival.

This surprise, it appears, was not an agreeable one to the colonel of the regiment, and the matter was referred to the Minister of War.

"Has the King," it was asked, "the right to order out a regiment without warning the Captain-General of Madrid or the Minister of War?" The military party says no, but the public, which cares nothing for military hierarchy, finds the affair very smart.

At the cabinet councils the King speaks very well, tries to impress his opinions on his advisers on various questions, and especially when it is a question of conferring decorations, reflects much. "You have no idea," said Conde de Romanos, Minister of Public Instruction, to the Figaro correspondent, "how difficult it is to get the King to confer a distinction of any kind. It was quite unexpected, and the ministers, instead of a boy, found they had to do with a man."

At 6 o'clock on Sunday morning all Madrid was awakened by a tremendous explosion. The shock was such that in the Royal Palace doors and windows were blown in. Everybody thought that an anarchist outrage had taken place. The reason, of course, was the explosion of the Carabanchel powder magazine.

At 9 o'clock there was a cabinet council. One of the ministers began by stating: "Your Majesty, a great disaster has just taken place near Madrid." "Yes, yes," interrupted the King; "I know all about it; I have just been there."

"In a word," adds the Figaro correspondent, "Alfonso XIII. has interrupted his reign by a display of character which has gained him general sympathy. His activity is really astonishing. He wants to know everything, he interests himself in everything, and he never loses an opportunity, either by word or deed, of proving that he is the King."

STANISLAS SAFE.
The French Chamber of Deputies on Saturday, after finalizing the elections of several deputies, including that of Count Stanislas de Castellane, adjourned sine die. The Senate also adjourned sine die.

TALKED TOO MUCH.
The czar has confirmed the sentence of twelve years' imprisonment at hard labor passed upon him in 1894, and he was convicted at Warsaw on June 1 of revealing Russian military secrets to a foreign power.

TARIFF ON COFFEE.
The merchants of Porto Rico are alarmed at advices from France forecasting the possibility of a prohibitive tariff on Porto Rican coffee. The Chamber of Commerce has called to Washington urging that such a tariff be not imposed.

POLISH DILEMMA.
Austria is being dragged against its will into the conflict between the Germans and the Russians. It was expected that the Austrians would show some preference for their brethren under Prussian rule. The Czechs are now rising up against the Kaiser and the Germans. The Czechs are the most westerly branch of the great Slav family of nations, and they number about 6,000,000 in Bohemia, Moravia and other parts of Austria.

There is much bitterness between the Czechs and the Germans, and the former are therefore taking a rapid part in attacking in newspapers and public addresses the Germanizing policy of Prussia. The description of Kaiser William as an escaped lunatic in a Bohemian official paper is but an illustration of the intense animosity on the part of the Czechs toward Germany. The Austrian Government may see fit to rebuke this reviling of the Berlin Kaiser, but will probably not notice it, for fear of inflaming the Czechs still more, and Kaiser William, who understands the situation thoroughly, will doubtless take no offense at the inaction of his imperial friend, Francis Joseph. It is possible, however, that the Czechs may force Francis Joseph to act, for the anti-German agitation is becoming more violent every day.

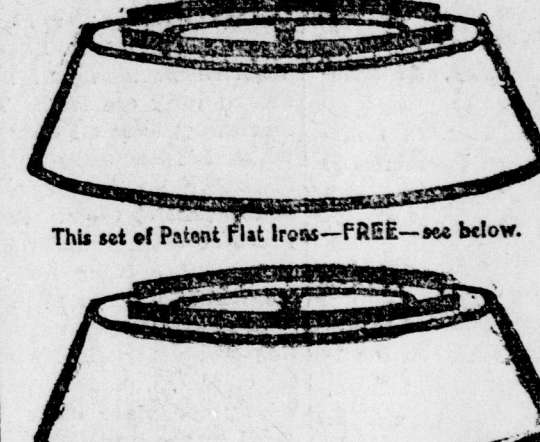

PLANS OF A DARING GIRL A RECORD-BREAKING RUN

Woman Who Fell 60 Feet From a Parachute Made by 20th Century Limited on the Lake Shore.

Will Recover and Ultimately Marry the Aeronaut.

Woonsocket, R. I., July 12. — Mabel Ward, the 17-year-old girl who fell 60 feet from a parachute at Hoag's Lake Park on July 4, will live. When entirely recovered she will marry Prof. Andrew Hillman, the aeronaut, for love of whom she made the balloon ascension.

As evidence of the sincere character of his affection, Hillman has taken up his abode at the home of Mabel Ward's parents in Milford.

On Thursday, 8,000 persons saw Hillman ascend in the balloon at Hoag's Lake Park. When 500 feet in the air he was caught in a whirlwind, and he dared not make the attempt to drop the parachute. He stuck to his balloon and landed only after a thrilling experience.

Louis Ward, Mabel's brother, also determined to make some more ascensions. Louis was caught by the leg in a dangling rope of the balloon and carried skyward, head down, until he was caught in a tree a week ago, but that experience has not discouraged him.

Mabel Ward's right leg has been amputated five inches above the knee. Her fractured jaw has been fixed in silk bandages. A cut entirely across the chin, laying the tongue and windpipe, has been stitched, yet through it all she has not only been conscious, but able to make known her wants.

TO WIPE OUT THE WHITES

Intent of Head Hunters in Solomon Islands—Many Massacres.

Vancouver, B. C., July 14. — Mail advices from Australia by the steamer Moana say the labor vessel Rio Lore (recruiting for labor in the Solomon Islands) has arrived in Brisbane, with startling news contained in a letter from Mr. Swanson, the government agent, dated Maran, Guadalcanar, Solomon Islands.

Mr. Swanson said that he was among a murderous band of natives who were intent upon massacring all the white settlers. The captain of the recruiting labor vessel, Roderick Dhu, had been murdered at Ura; the missionary and his wife at Ura were also killed and their heads carried away. A number of blacks friendly to the whites were also deprived of their heads.

Friendly natives say that the head-hunters are bent on murdering the whites on the island, and all blacks in sympathy with them, in retaliation against the act passed by the Federal Government of Australia prohibiting Solomon blacks working in the sugar plantations of Queensland.
