WHAT THE MEN DESIRE. The demands made by the men upon the company are these:

1. That the Toronto Railway Company shall recognize the union.

2. That Bro. James McDonald shall be reinstated by the company.

3. That the working days shall consist of nine hours as nearly as the runs shall permit. men, to the number of about 75, went out on strike this morning because

4. That each conductor and motorman shall receive 25 cents an hour and time and a quarter for Sunday.

5. That in the event of the suspension of a conductor or motorman an investigation shall be held, and if the employe is found blameless he shall be paid for lost time. and 30 cents an hour was not grant-

6. That the cars be cleaned and put in order for the conductor and motorman in the morning, and the conductor and motorman shall keep the inside and platforms of the cars clean while on duty.

7. Whenever the union shall require the temporary services of any of its members, such member or members shall get leave of absence from the company until such services are performed.

The company had refused to recognize the committee that waited upon Mr. Keating as representing the men, and had told them to go and call a mass meeting of all employes, union and non-union alike, at the same time offering to place Victoria Hall at their disposal to hold the meeting.

The committee that waited upon Mr. Keating consisted of W. H. Pickles, P. Langley and W. P. Thomson, but they were unable to come to any understanding.

Shortly after the conclusion of the meeting Mr. Keating sent the following ng. Shortly

letter to the committee:
"Messrs. Pickles, Thomson and Langley, Toronto: 'Gentlemen,-Referring to our inter-ew this morning, at which you preview this morning, at which you presented your credentials as a committee MEN'S REPLY TO MANAGER KEATrepresentative of the employes of this company, I beg to say that, as I view the matter, your credentials coupled with your own statements, show that in reality you were appointed merely to represent the members of the Toronto Railway Employes' Union and Benefit Society, at a meeting held on May 31 last.

THEY DID NOT ATTEND. "I have no doubt the meeting referred to spoke for a large number of men. But I desire to call your serious attention to the fact that I have quite recently been informed by themselves that a considerable number of our motormen and conductive are not members of the organiductors are not members of the organiductors are not members of the organization just named, and consequently did not attend the meeting at which you were appointed. Further, these men are of opinion that, in the light of the president's statement, that he had been engaged in investigating the wage question prior to May 31, and was prepared to act where the result of his inquiry, the whole upon the result of his inquiry, the whole situation has changed since then. These men, therefore, among them some of the oldest and most trusted employes, consider it not only advisable, but neces-sary, that a mass meeting of all the con-ductors and motormen should be held at the earliest possible moment, in order that a truly representative committee may be appointed to present the views of all to the management.

GIVE THEM A HALL. "In my judgment this proposal is a fair and reasonable one to all concerned. I have therefore much pleasure in placing Victoria Hall at the disposal of all our men for a mass meeting at midnight tonight, and cars will be supplied to carry men to the meeting and thence to

their homes.
"I trust that you, gentlemen, and those whom you immediately represent, will avail yourselves of the opportunity of eliciting the views of the entire body of our motormen and conductors, and have already informed you that I shall be glad to meet a committee appointed as here suggested at any time, and that such representations as it may make will reto the employes' union.

Toronto, Ont., June 16 .- The rush of settlers into the Rainy River Valley, following the completion of the Canadian Northern Railway, has led the committee to wait on Manager Keating Ontario Government to throw open for settlement all the remaining surveyed townships in that region, six in all. This will make a total of 28 townships open in the Rainy River Valley, each comprising about 23,000 acres, or a uniform scale, and a strike may entotal of 644,000 acres.
