Ascension to Ottoman Throne Accomplished Without Disturbance.

Abdul Hamid Accepts His Fate, Calmly Declaring It the Will of Allah-To Be Kept Prisoner.

Mehemmed is the 25th sovereign of Turkey, in male descent, of the house of Osman, the founder of the empire, and the 29th sultan since the conquest of Constantinople.

two houses of parliament, meeting as a national assembly in the forenoon, approved the decree of deposition, which was read by the Sheik-Ul-Islam, chief of the Ulemas, and the supreme judge of ecclesiastical ques-The document recited that Ab dul Hamid's acts were contrary to the sacred law, and set forth a long list of crimes, the whole making a terrible indictment. The assembly chose Mehemmed Reschad as sultan, and appointed committees to notify the dethroned sovereign and his successor of its action. The firing of 101 guns annced to the waiting people that a new sultan had been proclaimed.

#### New Monarch Cheered.

The ceremonies connected with the transfer of the power were simple. The new chosen ruler came from his palace in Galata through streets lined with troops and cheering thousands, and took the oath at the war office. He then proceeded to the parliament and later went to the Top-Kapou palace to kiss the prophet's robe, returning to the Dolmabagtsche as head of the em pire, where for so many years he had been practically a prisoner.

Martial law was relaxed tonight, and the people gave themselves over to celebrating the victory of the Young Turks party and the end of Abdul Hamid's reign. Many buildings were illuminated, and thousands of rounds of ammunition were fired by the soldiers everywhere

His brother, Abdul Hamid, replaced him on the throne. This was in 1876. He was intelligent, and, as he soon proved, he was cunning. Nor need we question his physical bravery. That also, he proved when, only a few days ago, knowing that 200 officers were said to have sworn to kill him, he drove, unruffled, from his palace to the mosque in which he had been accus-

## Flour Prices Going Down

Chicago, April 27.-Flour prices are going down rapidly, now that the bottom appears to have been knocked out of the so-called "Patten wheat corner," and millers today predicted that they would be back close to normal before many days. Several local millers announced today that they had cut the price to \$6 60, which is 20 cents under the prevailing price last Saturday, and 60 cents below the top figure, which prevailed when wheat was fluctuating about \$1 29. It is reported here that Minneapolis millers have not cut the price keeping it at \$7, but this is not expected to last long, as millers say the public will not pay that price for flour when it can be had from 40 to 50 cents cheaper. Europe is bidding for American flour on the assumption that wheat will soon go down to \$1 a bushel and there is little likelihood that foreign bidders will offer more than this, with the European wheat stocks increasing so rapidly.


