

Laurier Will Finish His Work

LIBERALS GO BACK TO POWER WITH MAJORITY OF FORTY-EIGHT BUT ONE MINISTER DEFEATED

The Government Ahead in Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan and Alberta—Liberals Make Remarkable Run In Ontario.

After one of the hardest-fought political campaigns Canada has ever witnessed, the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been sustained by a majority which, when all the returns are in, will be nearly 50.

In the face of a campaign which consisted almost wholly of misrepresentation and scandalous cries, the Government fought hard and strong, coming out of the conflict with flying colors.

As a result Ontario was treated to as bitter and venomous a campaign as could possibly be contrived. The Province was thoroughly soaked with scandal, it was thought by the Conservative speakers, and they looked with confidence to rolling it over.

In Quebec the result was a foregone conclusion. The Conservatives made little or no headway. The parties stand practically as they did in 1904.

Mr. W. L. Mackenzie King, who will be minister of labor in the Government, had a notable triumph in North Waterloo. Sir Wilfrid himself was elected for two constituencies, Ottawa and Quebec.

GLOOM IN TORY TORONTO OVER THE ELECTION RESULTS MR. FOSTER WAS VERY SAD

Like Hon. Mr. Roblin, His Voice Went Back on Him, and He Made Only Short Speech—Liberals Were Jubilant Over Laurier's Splendid Victory—Mr. Robinette Not Cast Down.

Toronto, Oct. 27.—From Halifax to Vancouver during the campaign Conservative newspapers have cried to Liberals, imploring them to free themselves from machine control.

Excitement Ran High. Rarely, indeed, has Toronto been so stirred by an election. The splendid fight put up by Mr. T. C. Robinette in Centre Toronto leaves him defeated by a narrow majority, but not discouraged.

MAJOR BEATTIE RE-ELECTED LABOR CANDIDATE DEFEATED

Conservative Organization Was Perfect While That of Mr. J. W. McCandless Was Very Poor—Major's Majority Is 1,167.

Major Beattie, the Conservative candidate, was elected by a majority of 1,167. This is an increase of 131 over the majority in the by-election of 1907.

The Labor party lacked organization. They had but a short time in which to prepare for a contest, and did not get out their whole available vote.

As usual the Conservatives were thoroughly organized, and polled practically their available vote.

Nipissing Is Reported Liberal Win

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—Charles McCool, Liberal, is in Ottawa today, and states he has received word from Nipissing that his election there is assured. He has been reported as defeated.

Big Welcome Home For Premier

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—The Liberals are preparing a big welcome home to the Premier to Ottawa, and are getting enthusiastic over the matter. It is not yet known for which of his two constituencies the Premier will sit.
