PECULIAR RULINGS OF BUILDING BYLAWS

Richmond Street Baker Hauled Into Court by the City Architect

A peculiar phase of the new building bylaws was shown at the police court this morning, when Mr. James Ruddy, owning property on Richmond street north, was summoned by City Architect Nutter. A short time ago a roof on Mr. Ruddy's place was burned off in a fire, and as soon as the insurance valuers had gone over the building Mr. Ruddy told a contractor to go ahead and make any repairs necessary.

The contractor did the work, making it as nearly as possible the same as before.

According to the bylaw Mr. Ruddy is not allowed to do this, as it was enacted that no combustible work shall be allowed to be done on buildings.

"The contractor should have known about this," said Magistrate Love. "Mr. Ruddy left the work entirely with him."

It was decided to adjourn the case for two weeks to give Mr. Ruddy a chance to make the roof satisfactory to the city architect.

NEW STEEL WILL BE LAID BY STREET RAILWAY

Work Will Be Commenced at Once and Rushed to Completion.

The London street railway will commence tearing up their tracks on Richmond and Dundas streets next week to lay their new steel on these thoroughfares.

Word has been received that the rails will be shipped on at once, and the work will be proceeded with.

The water commissioners will at the same time lay their conduits, and the Bell Telephone Company, will finish their work.

"It means that the streets must either be torn up during fair week or delayed until next year," said Engineer Wright. "I think it would be preferable to have the pavements laid this year, and wait until after the year. The work will be rushed ahead as soon as possible."

MISS HOBSON'S CONDITION IS VERY CRITICAL NOW

Hamilton Lady Was Injured When London Nurse Was Killed in an Auto Accident.

Hamilton, Aug. 10.—Miss Dorothy Hobson, who was seriously injured in the fatal auto accident on the Strongman road several weeks ago, when Miss L. Perkins, of London, was killed, has made a brave fight for her life, but it is feared that she will not live very many days more, and the latest report from the hospital and the physicians who are attending her is that she is very low, and little hope is held out for her recovery. The physicians, although admitting it, entertained but slight hope from the start, for the internal injuries she received were serious, and that she is alive today is little short of a miracle.

FINED \$500 FOR CRUELTY TO HORSE

The Animal Had Been Terribly Beaten and Overdriven.

North Bay, Ont., Aug. 10.—After some clever detective work on the part of Provincial Constable Storey, August Lukumsen, a Scandinavian, was fined \$500 and costs, at Sudbury, for cruelly abusing a horse.

Lukumsen, a friend named Kalla Werkeiner, were reported to have borrowed a horse and rig at Sudbury. The animal was found next day in a field near Copper Cliff, showing signs of having been terribly beaten and overdriven.

Before the magistrate, Werkeiner proved that he was not in the buggy after it left Sudbury, and he was consequently discharged. His companion had to bear the brunt of the charge, and the imposition of the above severe penalty.
