"DANNY" MAHER WINS FOUR RACES AT ASCOT

American Jockey Captures Gold Cup, Three Others and a Second, Out of Four Mounts.

Ascot Heath, England, June 16.—"Danny" Maher, the American jockey who has scored over a thousand successes on the English turf, had a remarkable run of victories at the Ascot meeting today. He piloted horses that won in four races and finished second in another event. "Skeets" Martin, another American jockey, captured the premier honors in the fifth race, the American leaving only one first and a walk-over on the day's card for the British jockeys.

The gold cup, the feature here, was captured by Mr. Fairlie's Bayardo, ridden by the American jockey, "Danny" Maher. W. K. Vanderbilt's Seaside II. was second, and J. Lowry's Bachelor's Double third. There were thirteen starters.

Gold Cup Day attracted a great crowd. The big event is an international contest, the entries including American and French horses, as well as British. The American-bred St. Martin, owned by Louis Wiggins and ridden by "Skeets" Martin, and Bayardo, from the stables of Mr. Fairlie, and ridden by another American jockey, "Danny" Maher, carried the bulk of the public money. The gold cup, with a value of 500 sovereigns with 3,500 sovereigns in specie in addition, is offered for three-year-olds and up. The distance is two miles and a half.

The all-ages stake of five sovereigns each with 300 sovereigns added, for two-year-olds and upwards, distance six furlongs, was won by H. P. Whitney's Neveine third, only three horses ran. Neveine third, only three horses ran.

LOOKS LIKE RENO WILL GET BIG FIGHT

Tex Rickard Gives Governor Till Saturday to Change Mind.

ATTORNEY TO TRY IT ON THE DOG

The Kaufman-Langford Show Is Carded for Tomorrow.

San Francisco, June 16.—Tex Rickard announced definitely tonight that he would make no effort to contest the injunction proceedings ordered by Gov. Gillett to enjoin the Johnson-Jeffries fight.

"I will give Governor Gillett until Saturday to change his mind," said Rickard, "and if he is determined to prevent the fight in San Francisco I will put up stakes and make for Reno. I will make no fight in court, as my attorneys have advised me that it would be useless."

San Francisco, June 16.—Speaking for San Francisco, this fine, hustling city among the hills is holding its civic breath. Rickard and Johnson have suddenly been shunted into the background and everyone is intent on the two-handed scrap between Gov. Gillett and Tex Rickard et al.

The governor declares the law is behind him; the lawyers behind Rickard, and so intense is the situation that a falling cigarette ash would create a stampede. The attorney-general says: "There will be no fight."

Attorney-General Webb says: "I shall carry out my orders."
Mayor P. M. McCarthy, en route from Chicago to Los Angeles, closely pursued by a trail of blue fire, says: "Who is running San Francisco, Gillett or me. Of course there will be no fight. What have we got policemen for? Fight? You bet your bright young life there will be a fight."

Mr. Tex Rickard, the stinger in this proceeding, offers himself a little more chewing tobacco, mops his neck and says: "Settle it one way or the other before Saturday. Otherwise me for some other state."

Frisco Wants It
And San Francisco, which has always been a red-blooded community, is roaring for the big show.

Through the present complications, Saturday's bout between the two men, Al Kaufman, a second-rate attraction at best, takes on a flavor of international interest. The attorney-general is going to try the prescription on the dog.

Tomorrow he will go before one of the superior court judges asking for the injunction restraining Promoter Louis Biot and the principals in Saturday's little affair.

Try It on the Dog
Should the judge refuse this injunction, the attorney-general announces that he will be inside of two rounds to decide whether or not the law is being violated in other words, he says he will be able to tell from the actions of Kaufman and Langford whether the men are engaging in a prize fight or boxing exhibition.

If in his opinion the men are breaking the law he says he will have them arrested at once and charged with committing a felony.

Tex Rickard is not saying an unnecessary word. He had a long talk with District Attorney Fickert, of San Francisco, and emerged with a smiling face. On Rickard's face illuminated the whole north side of town, and the word was carried "south of the river" to the city.

Just what action will be taken by the legal forces engaged to represent Rickard is not known, but the promoters believe that the law is with them and are prepared to make a short, decisive battle for their rights as they see them.

Must Decide by Saturday
Whatever the legal battle may be, Rickard says it must be complete by Saturday, or on that date he will begin making preparations to transfer the event to some other state.

Reno, Nevada, of easy divorce fame, will probably be selected and at the very hint that this thriving city in the mountains may take the right away from San Francisco, there goes up anguished wails from those citizens of San Francisco who hate to see that much good money going out of the state. Rickard realizes that he must move quickly, as every day's delay is a body blow to the gate receipts.

"How I wish I could see the governor with a smile," said the Governor of California, who has been some time in office, never before discovered that the law was being violated.

Awakening Comes Late
"This moral awakening is a bit late," it seems to me. If the other men who have promoted forty-five round contests in this state were not interfered with and were within their legal rights, why not me?

A great deal of sympathy for Rickard is being expressed today. Those who should have known informed him that he might count on no interference in California.

The governor himself, while never sanctioning the affair, and at the very least there was no legal way of preventing it, and Gillett's sudden change of heart is one of the most interesting things in connection with the middle.

Gov. Rickard arrived here this morning from Sacramento. He was informed that Rickard was contemplating an action for heavy damages.

Gillett Shows Fight
"Not a chance," said the governor. "Ridiculous. If Mr. Rickard wants a fight he can get it. He will get a more bitter fight than the one he is advertising for the Fourth of July."

Jeffries and Johnson, who thus unceremoniously bumped into the background, agree that they will fight anywhere under Rickard's management. Because they are fighting for a purse they are, quite naturally, not financially flattered by the events of the past few days. Rickard is hearing this burden alone. He put up all the money.

Johnson Doesn't Worry
Of course the fighters are worried, and Jeffries seems annoyed to a certain extent, but "Lil' Arthur" is not lost in any sleep. There are still a few dozen chickens in the coop, and even with the automobile in the garage, Johnson manages to while away the time.

"I came through the park today," said Johnson, "riding in a back seat on a borrowed automobile. You know what happened? Two fast cars came along and flirted with me—yes, sir, flirted with me. They knew I did not have any car."

The sporting gentlemen from eastern points, in convulsive assembly, are worried, but not wholly cast down.

Go to Reno, Nevada
"Nothing to it," say the optimists. "If the worst comes to the worst, we'll all go to Reno and live in tents until this thing is over. Of course it will hurt the gate some, but there are the moving pictures. It looks now that the only outlet Rickard and Gleason will have is the picture thing."

NOT A HEALTHY SIGN

Pauperism in England Appears To Be on Increase.

London, June 17.—The number of unemployed and the extent of pauperism, according to figures being published in the English papers, is simply appalling. One person in every thirty-seven in England and Wales is a pauper, according to statistics just issued by the local government board.

The year 1909 opened with just a little short of 1,000,000 persons in receipt of relief, an increase of 1.4 per cent over the previous year. There were 145,738 able-bodied paupers on January 1, 1909, this vast army of unproductive consumers having increased by 18,498 in twelve months. The number of able-bodied men relieved on account of want of work or

other temporary causes increased during the same period by 133 per cent. The total number of persons supported or assisted by the community is the highest recorded since 1872, although calculated in relation to the increase of population the proportion is lower.

The number of casual paupers has increased by 25 per cent since 1900, sixteen million pounds is expended annually by the poor law authorities, and the distribution of the local authorities has risen to £20,000,000; in London alone some £10,000,000 is expended every year on charity.

Outlook Admittedly Worse.
The outlook for the coming winter here is admittedly worse than last winter, when the authorities had to deal with a greater extent of unemployment than in any year since the distress committees of the local government board took up the heroic task. During the winter of 1908-9 distress was twice as bad as in the preceding year, both as regards the total number of applicants for work and the number of applications entertained. One in every eighty-five persons in districts covered by distress committees registered themselves as out of work last winter. The great majority of the applicant were under fifty years of age.

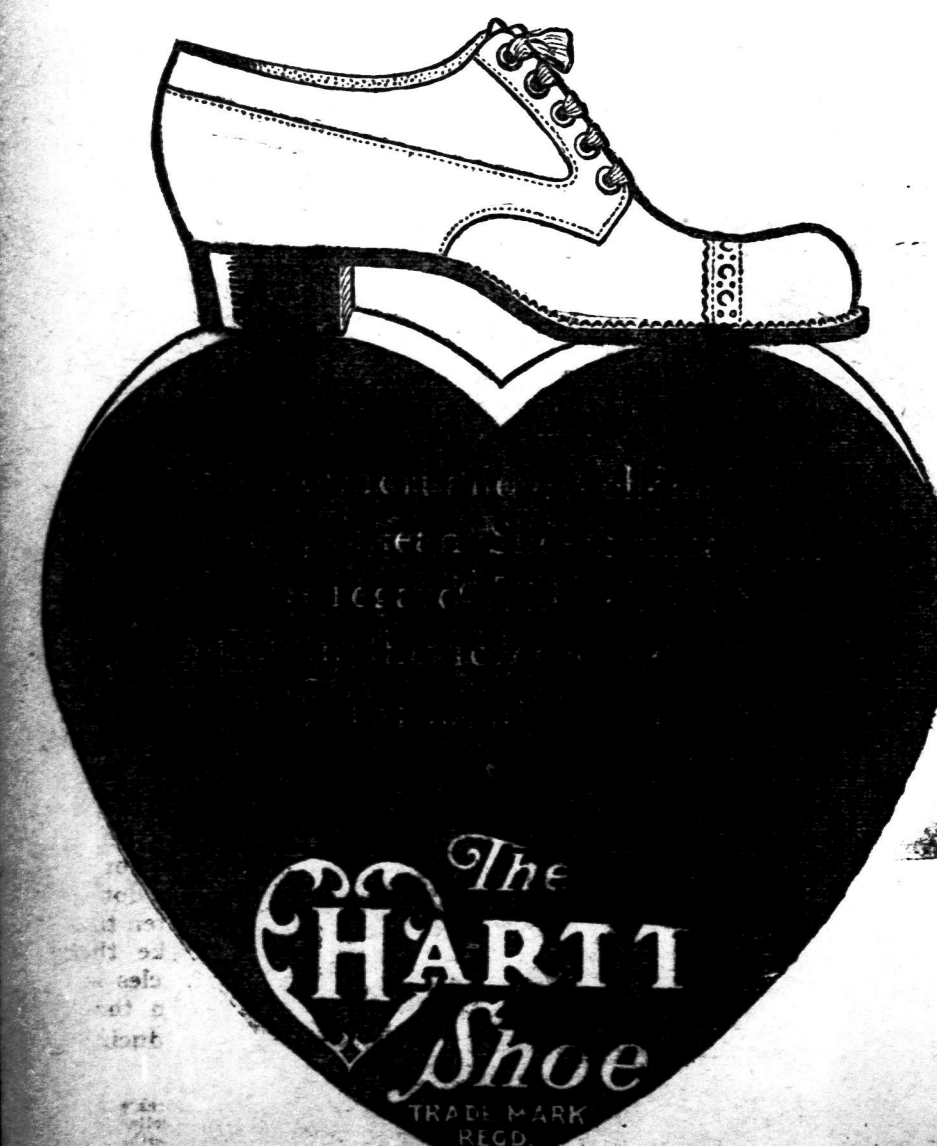
entertaining them there, but it was pointed out that Springbank is now under local option, and that liquid refreshments could not be served there.
