CITIZEN HAS COPY OF LONDON TIMES RECOUNTING BATTLE OF TRAFALGAR AND THE DEATH OF ADMIRAL NELSON

"The Thunderer" of More Than One Hundred Years Ago, Reports Movements of Ships During Battles From Official Accounts of Vice-Admiral Cunningham-Some of the Old-Time Advertisements.

A local gentleman has in his possession a copy of the London (England) Times, for Thursday, Nov. 7, 1805. The ket-sheet, including four pages, and four large columns to the page, and was sold at sixpence per copy. The leading article is an account of the battle of Trafalgar, and the death of Admiral Nelson. It is signed by Vice-Admiral C. Collingwood, and is credited to the Official Gazette of the previous day, as follows:

The London Gazette Extraordinary "Wednesday, Nov. 6, 1805."
The good vice-admiral, in his dis-The good vice-admiral, in his dispatch, narrates the course of events leading up to and including the battle, in the exact order of their occurrence. His opening sentence forms a very substantial paragraphi:

"Euryalus, of Cape Trafalgar,
"Oct. 22, 1895.

"Sir.—The ever-to-be-lamented death

"Sir,—The ever-to-be-lamented death of Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Neison, who, in the late conflict with the enemy, fell in the hour of victory, leaves to me the duty of informing my lords commissioners of the admiralty that on the 19th inst. it was communithat on the 19th inst, it was communicated to the commander-in-chief, from the ships watching the motions of the enemy in Cadiz, that the combined fiest had put to sea; as they sailed with light winds westerly, his lordship concluded their destination was the Mediterranean, and immediately made all sail for the Streights' entrance, with the British squadron, consisting of twenty-seven ships, three of them sixty-fours, where his lordship was informed by Capt. 
