SOCIETIES TO SHOW**CLEAN BILL OF HEALTH**

Says E. T. Essery, of London,
in Support of New Insurance
Bill.

Toronto, April 28.—"This bill will turn
fraternal societies into life insurance
companies," declared Mr. P. M. Pat-
terson, Toronto, at the annual meeting
of the Canadian Fraternal Association yester-
day. He was discussing the bill intro-
duced by Mr. J. A. Patterson, K. C.,
chairman of a special drafting committee,
to regulate fraternal benefit societies,
and he added that proposals like this
were making every fraternal society un-
easy.

An explanation had just been made
by Mr. Patterson. He said the bill pro-
posed that every three years each so-
ciety should report to the registrar of
insurance a valuation of its assets and
liabilities and send a copy to every mem-
ber. If the registrar was not satisfied
that the return of valuation shows that
the society is actuarially sound he will
order to improve its deficiency of 5 per
cent every three years so that in 60
years all societies would be actuarially
sound. There was nothing to prevent
a society improving itself faster if it
wished, but if it did not advance at the
rate of 5 per cent every three years the
registrar could cancel its registration. It
was not a rate bill compelling every so-
ciety to come to a uniform rate, but al-
lowing societies to improve at their own
pace.

"It simply purports that societies
should show a clean bill of health every
three years," said Mr. E. T. Essery,
London, who agreed that public opinion
demanded such a measure, and if the
societies did not originate it Parliament
would force it. "Surely it is better to
let them undertake an own reform and
have 60 years in which to finish it, than
have Parliament tell us to do it in much
less time," was the sum of Essery's argu-
ment.

Controller McCarthy attended on behalf
of the mayor and welcomed the dele-
gates to Toronto.

Sunday at the residence of her son, Wm.

member of the Baptist church, and the
oldest resident on the street. She

Buller, of this city; four daughters, Mrs.
S. Hart, Central avenue; Mrs. W. Mott,
sheffield; Mrs. W. Bell, 712 Maitland
street; Mrs. C. Young, Maitland street;
one sister, Mrs. Walter Fairbairn, Col-
borne street, and one brother, Mr. C.
Riley, of Oxford street.
