PROTESTS ARE IN VAIN

Letter From Capt. Kruger Contains Instructions To Infect Mines.

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, May 5 .- 8:25 p.m. -- In suport of charges that the Germans had poisoned wells in the southwest African campaign, Lewis Harcourt, secretary of state for the colonies, tonight issued a communication in which he says that woen General Louis Botha, commander of the Union of South Africa forces, occupied Swakopmund he discovered that six wells poisoned by an arsenical cattle wash. As a remonstrance General Botha sent communication to Colonel Francke ommander of the German forces. This elicited a response, according to the statement of Mr. Harcourt, that the Berman troops had been given orders that "if they possibly can prevent it. not to allow any water supplies to fall into the hands of the enemy in a form which allows it to be used for man or beast."

When Swakopmund was evacuated, the reply of Colonel Francke concluded. the officer in charge ordered several bags of cooking-salt thrown into the wells, but it was found that this could in a short time be rendered ineffective Thereafter, Colonel Francke's letter said "We tried the copper dip and found that by using this material any enemy time have to rely on water from else-

The communication says that despite General Botha's protest the practice continued. A message said to have been from Captain Kruger, of the German protectorate troops, intercepted March 22, is quoted in the communication as saying: "The patrol at Gabib has been in-
