ALLIES NOW HOLD 49 VILLAGES AND 190 SQUARE MILES

60,000 Prisoners Have Been Taken in Offensive.

GERMANS SEEM HELPLESS

Bringing Up of Six New Divisions Has No Effect on Onslaught.

[Canadian Press.]

Paris, Sept. 27.—The capture of Cambes with its great booty completes what is regarded by military experts here as one of the most brilliantly executed operations of the summer campaign. The whole front of attack from Martinielle to the Somme has been pushed forward uniformly for more than a mile. Military observers here state that the fullness of the success proves that the Allies are incontrovertibly masters of the situation.

Since September 15 the Germans had brought up three fresh divisions against the trench front, and the same number against the British. On the 20th they made a desperate effort to retake Bouchavesnes.

Overcome Foe's Advantages. The new divisions, which had five days later the Allies, resumed the offensive, hurled back their line in spite of the fact that considerable advantages had been gained by the British.

The progress made by the French beyond Bouchavesnes is regarded here as one of the most surprising results of the operations. French officers declare that this success demonstrates the growing power of the French offensive and the falling resistance of the Germans. The hills which surround this village were swept on Sept. 25 by all the German artillery from St. Pierre Vaast wood in the north to Mont St. Quentin in the south. Nevertheless, the French, by the capture of Hill 130, which threatened directly at Arras, paved the way for a victorious enveloping movement around Mont St. Quentin and Peronne.

French Press Optimistic. The newspapers compare the present offensive with the bloody and futile attempts of the French to break through the German lines in the Artois and Champagne last year, and express the greatest optimism over the present situation.

All the military writers in the newspapers state that the ones in the Monday's and Tuesday's fighting are among the most important gained in the whole series of battles on the Somme. They point out that the recent successes have not only tactical value but that generally the situation has been sensibly modified, a consequence which, they say, will soon be evident.

Realize the "Big Is Up." The phrase in the official statement from Berlin, "we are obliged to admit the success," is interpreted by our advisers as a sign that the Germans know that the Allies are getting the upper hand and are trying to explain away by declaring that the whole situation of the world are being used against them. The papers exultantly sum up the results to date of the great offensive as 44 villages and 190 square miles of territory, conquered, and 60,000 prisoners taken.

RALLY IN HIGHGATE. Highgate, Sept. 26.—Rally day services were held in the Highgate Methodist Church Sunday morning at 10:30. J. F. Stone, superintendent of the Sunday school, had charge of the service, assisted by the pastor, Rev. E. J. James. Excellent addresses were given by Rev. P. E. James, A. Burke and Mrs. Wright. A returned missioner from China, who spoke on "Our Country's Call to the Young."

A peach social under the auspices of the Bible class will be held near the church on the 1st of October. The program of the evening, the Presbyterian Church, Dundas, Friday evening. A meeting will be held in the basement of the Methodist Church on Tuesday evening to reorganize classes for the church society for the winter. Mr. Cummings of Chatham will have charge of the classes.

DEATH OF JOHN BRIDGEMAN. ST. MARYS, Sept. 26.—John H. Bridgeman, an old resident of the South Ward, who had been in failing health for some time, died yesterday at his residence, 100 Water street, of an affection of the heart. Mr. Bridgeman was in his 77th year. He was married twice. There survive a widow, two sons and three daughters. As one of the sons in the line of the date of the funeral has not yet been fixed.
