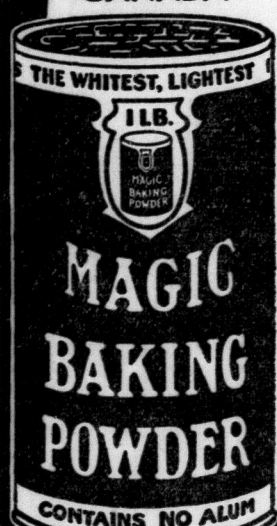

## BIGGS TO OPEN NEW HIGHWAY

Minister of Public Works Will Conduct Hamilton Road Ceremonies At Galt.

GALT, Nov. 2.—It is expected that the official opening of the Galt-Hamilton highway will take place on Wednesday next, that date being satisfactory to Hon. P. C. Biggs. It was announced today by the superintendent

of the paving company doing the work that they expected to finish the job on Saturday, as they wished to have the highway open for heavy traffic there is bound to be over the holiday. It is hoped to have Premier E. C. Drury here for the official opening.

## YOUNG FARMERS JUDGE ANIMALS

Government Agricultural Bureau Conducts Contest Under Direction of R. A. Finn.

The government agricultural bureau, under the direction of R. A. Finn, Middlesex representative, yesterday held a livestock-judging contest, open to young farmers of the district under 26 years old, and silver cups were presented to the winners in the different classes at the local agricultural bureau on Thursday night.

The judging of sheep and beef cattle took place at Col. R. McEwen's farm at Byron in the morning. Heavy horses were judged at the Lafayette Stock Farm, and dairy cattle and swine at the Ontario Hospital grounds.  
Over 50 men entered the contest, and the winners were as follows:  
Murray Allen of Appin, winner of the silver cup donated by Col. McEwen for the best judging of sheep; Harvey Owens of Clandeboy won the cup presented by the Home Bank for being the best judge of beef cattle; J. A. McNeil of Strathroy took first honors in the judging of heavy horses, winning the cup given by the London Chamber of Commerce; George Pack won the cup donated by G. E. Pearson, manager of the Bank of Montreal for the best judging of swine; Dermid McTaggart of Appin took the cup presented by Ray Lawson for being the best judge of dairy cattle.

### Present Cups.

The judges of the contests were: Beef cattle, M. C. McPhail; sheep, D. McEwen and R. H. Harding; heavy horses, R. S. Duncan; swine, R. H. Harding; dairy cattle, Howard Truman.

At the presentation of the cups to the various winners last night the above-mentioned judges gave short addresses, and explained the qualifications to be considered in the judging of the various kinds of livestock.

## SAYS STORY NOT SEDITIOUS LIBEL

Counsel For Editor Declares Duty of Press To Publish Article.

QUEBEC, Nov. 2.—(By Canadian Press.)—On an order of the Quebec Legislative Assembly, John H. Roberts, editor of the Montreal weekly The Axe, was this afternoon handed over to the custody of the sergeant-at-arms of the House, J. O. Delisle, who will produce him either in the House or in any law court where his presence might be required.

QUEBEC, Nov. 2.—At the afternoon session in the case of John H. Roberts, editor of the Axe, a weekly publication of Montreal, who is charged with seditious libel, Armand Lavergne, K.C., counsel for Roberts, declared that the article complained of was not seditious and contended that it was a duty as a newspaperman to have done so. It is about a rumor that the article was written, he claims, and there was no direct attack against the administration of justice.

Judge Choquette reserved his decision for tomorrow. In the meantime Roberts will remain under the guard of the high constable and if bail for \$5,000—or even less, said the judge, is produced, "as I understand he is a stranger in town, he will be granted his liberty." Judge Choquette also decided that a warrant issued by a magistrate can be executed in any part of the province. Mr. Lavergne had contended that the warrant was illegal because not endorsed by a judge of the Montreal district.

## Claims Men Pastors Are Jealous of Women in Pulpit.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Reverend men by men preachers against the ever-increasing invasion of the pulpit by women is based purely on jealousy, says the Rev. Martha M. Rogers, acting pastor of the Hanson Place Methodist-Episcopal Church, Brooklyn. She flung the challenge at male divines who are inclined to disparage woman's place in the ministry, and demands that women be recognized as their equals in the pulpit.  
"The truth of the matter is that the minister on his pedestal does not like it when women try to enter the ministry. They feel that women in church work are all right to fill in the gaps. But when a woman begins to fill in the gaps too well their manner becomes cold and constrained," she said.
