

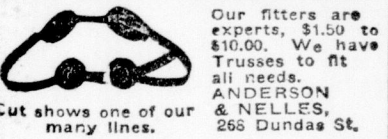

Dr. Banting Comes Home To London and His Silence Proves Claim To Modesty

Discoverer of Insulin Retreats Into a Shell At Attempted Interview.

REFRESHINGLY RUDE

Denies, However, Advocating Afternoon Rests With Cup of Tea.

Dr. Frederick Banting, discoverer of insulin, benefactor of mankind, and recipient of the world's grateful honors, came home to London last night.

But Dr. Banting didn't want London to know anything about it. When The Advertiser, in the person of a duly impressed reporter, met one of the ten most famous men in the world at the old C. N. R. station, the latter gave an excellent dual impersonation of an oyster in one of its most silent moments and a turtle retreating into its shell.

Perhaps it's not a very dignified way in which to speak of the winner of the Nobel prize, but it's true. Dr. Banting wouldn't say anything, and following that he retreated into a convenient car clutching a club bag to his breast and disappeared, hitting on all six cylinders.

Very, Very Modest.

Dr. Banting is a modest man. One understands how he earned the verdict of English newspapers as "the most modest man in the world." He is so modest that he is almost violent. But one can't help liking him. All the honors he has received have not turned his head. He is not conceited. He is not really self-conscious. He is genuinely modest, and utterly uninterested in publicity. He reminds one a little of a small boy asked to recite something in front of the class when he wants to go swimming. Dr. Banting would rather be messing around with test tubes and things, dressed in a dirty lab coat than bother with newspapers or the dear public. He has something of Shaw's contempt for what people think about him, and one can't help liking him for it. It is a refreshing rudeness.

But to get on with the encounter. The Advertiser reporter approached Dr. Banting. Dr. Banting glowered.

Wants to Fight.

"You're a reporter? I wish they'd send me someone I could lick."

"Oh, yes," murmured the reporter encouragingly.

"What they said I said about afternoon tea was a lie," said Dr. Banting. He was referring to a recent report in which he was described as an advocate of afternoon rest and a cup of tea. The reporter believed the denial because Dr. Banting was striding along the platform as if he had never rested in his life.

So did the reporter. He had to or be left behind.

"In what disease has science made greatest progress towards a cure?" asked The Advertiser.

"Bah!" replied the great scientist, by this time safely ensconced in the car.

The reporter approached. Dr. Banting placed his club bag upon his knees and hid behind it.

"Drive on," quoth he to the man at the wheel, and the driver drove.

One concluded that the progress of science held little of encouragement.

HOLES DUG IN ROAD IS EXPLANATION
Only Reason That Can Be Advanced in \$3,000 Damage Suit.

In the opinion of Councillor Parker of Adelaide Township, some person must have dug holes in the township road, near Mud Creek, early in the evening of Oct. 18 last. That is the only way the councillor could explain the big cavities in the road that Henry Brown struck when he passed that way in his motor car at 9:30 that night, causing his car to plunge over a 30-foot embankment. Mr. Brown was injured, and his car was wrecked, and he wants \$3,000 damages from the township.

All the evidence in the action was heard before Mr. Justice Kelly at the supreme court sittings yesterday, argument by counsel being reserved for this morning. It is likely that his lordship will reserve decision.

The opinion of Councillor Parker was gained in cross-examination by J. M. McAvoy, K.C., acting for Mr. Brown. Mr. Parker thought the road was O.K. that afternoon, but that the road next day was certainly not in good repair. Other witnesses for the defence yesterday afternoon included Reeve Sullivan, County Engineer Charles Talbot and Miss M. Dewar of the London weather bureau, who gave data as to rainfall.

J. C. Elliott, K.C., is acting for the township, and called a number of witnesses during the afternoon to prove that the township had not been negligent in the upkeep of the road.

ROBERTS OF MONTREAL PLEADS GUILTY OF LIBEL

Montreal, May 30.—Pleading guilty to two charges of defamatory libel, John H. Roberts was today given a little fatherly advice and a suspended sentence by Justice Wilson in court of king's bench.

The two charges were laid in 1922 on the complaint of B. B. Bryan of Logan & Bryan, and referred to as sections made by the accused in a weekly newspaper.

FOREIGN SETTLEMENTS DISCUSSED.

Montreal, May 30.—The situation in Western Canada as regards foreign settlements was referred to Dr. A. J. Hunter, medical superintendent of the mission hospital at Toulon, Manitoba, in an address before the general council of the W. M. S. of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at last night's session. An important result of hospital work, Dr. Hunter pointed out, was the establishment of friendly relations with the people. Dr. Hunter said that there are 300,000 Ukrainians successful settlers in many ways, but bringing problems into Canada, among others that of national sentiment.

The Ukrainians did not want to be "assimilated." They think that the Anglo-Saxons want to swallow them up. The finger of scorn is pointed at converts, and Ukrainian missionaries were called traitors and hirelings, who "follow the English and are untrue to their own people."

It was decided to meet in Regina in 1926.

REFERENCE TO DEPOSITS ARE DENIED BY MAGUIRE

Toronto Ex-Mayor Declares Himself Innocent of Charges At Hearing.

Toronto, May 30.—At no time during his term of controllership in the city council did Charles Alfred Maguire discuss with the finance commissioner the question of the quality of the city's deposits with banks having their head offices in Toronto, especially with reference to giving the Home Bank of Canada a greater share of the city's business. Such was the definite assertion made by ex-Mayor Maguire this afternoon at the enlargement of the hearing instituted by the liquidator before the official receiver, Charles M. Garrow, K.C., to determine under what circumstances Frederick H. Richardson received payments totalling \$13,500 from the Home Bank.

HEIR TO BIG FORTUNE UNABLE TO PAY FINE

Stanley Merritt, Known as the "Dandelion King," Confined in City Jail.

Stanley Merritt, known as the "Dandelion King," the writer of several popular songs and the heir to a fortune of between \$25,000 and \$40,000, is now confined to the jail here. The reported heir of enough cash to pay many O. T. A. fines has found himself for the time being at least unable to gather together the \$200 for the fine that has been imposed upon him for the breach of the temperance act.

Merritt, whose home is in Chatham, was brought to London yesterday by Provincial Constable Stratton, who arrested his prisoner at Glencoe, where he had been making a disturbance at the summer camp of Mrs.

Currie. For having two gallons of wine in his possession he was given the option of the fine or three months, being without the necessary funds he was sent down.

It is said that the prisoner is the heir to one-third of his father's estate, which would probably net him \$15,000. His mother also is well off, and from her estate it has been estimated there will be a fair-sized fortune. Mr. Merritt, senior, died a short time ago, and sufficient time has not elapsed to have the will filed for probate. In the meantime

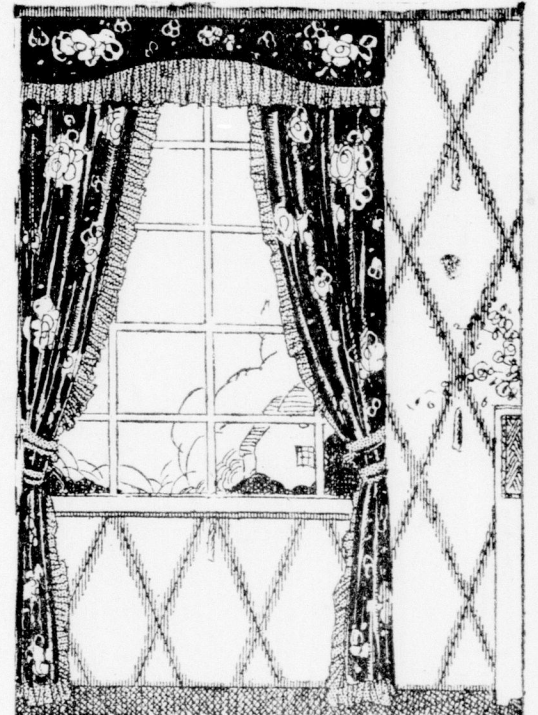

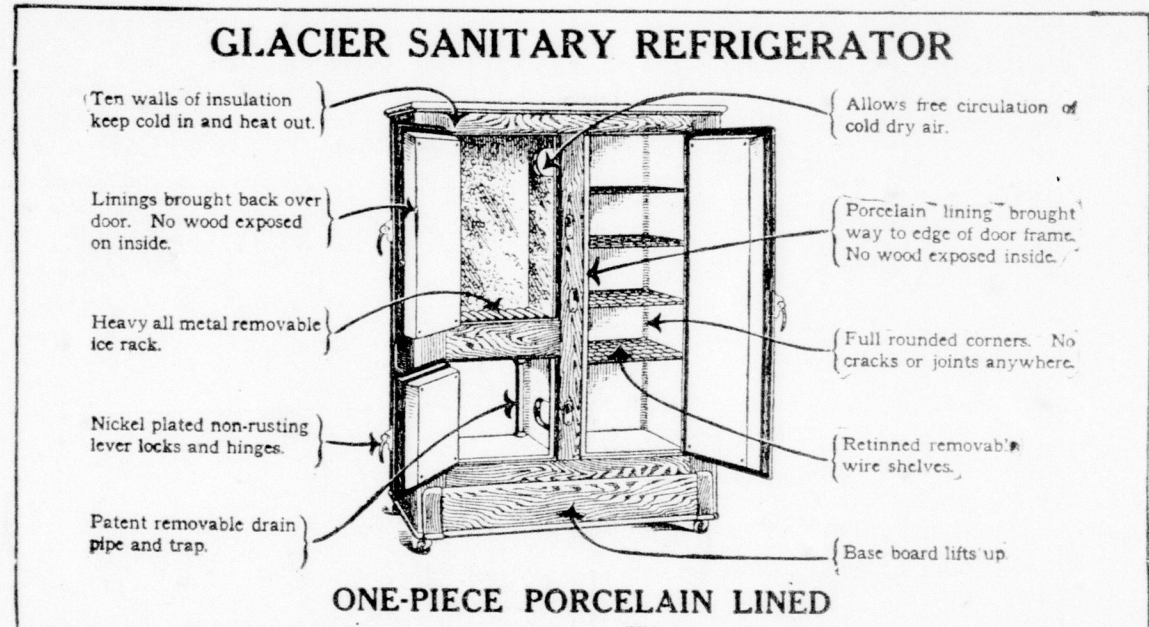

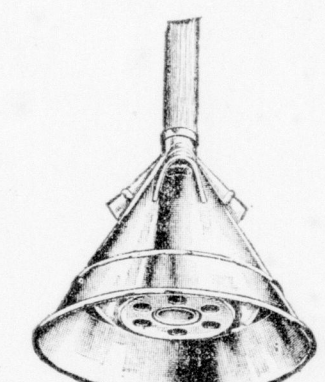
