EXTRAORDINARY TALE OF A CAT.—On Thursday, George Amey, No. 12 Fitzroy place, was brought before Mr Knox on a warrant, charging him with having violently assaulted Isabella Amey, his wife. Assistance came in an unexpected form, and she was rescued from further ill-treatment, her husband making his escape. The wife told the warrant officer Rosekelly that while on the ground and screaming, a favorite cat suddenly sprang on her husband and fastened her claws in his eyes and her teeth in his face. Her husband could not tear the cat away, and he was obliged to implore her to take the cat from him to save his life. Mr Knox, having ascertained that the husband had been in the habit of ill-treating his wife, sent him to prison for one month.—*Eng. Paper.*
