Rev. Dr. Parker, Rev. Mr. Pickering, the retiring minister, Rev. Mr. Lanceley, the incoming pastor, Senator Macdonald and William
Gooderham. The Senator, in his address, referred to the history of the Richmond-street
Church since its establishment in 1843. Of
the gatherings who worshipped in its walls
then only three were present on this occasion.
They were Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Morphy and
himself. The corner stone on the northwest
angle was laid by Senator Macdonald, and the
southwest one by William Gooderham, each
using silver trowels presented to them by the
congregation as souvenirs of the occasion.
Within the cavity in each stone were placed,
hermetically sealed glass jars containing
copies of the city papers, the coins of the
realm, records of the church, etc.

On Saturday's bright warm afternoon Rev. J. M. Cameron laid the corner stone of the new Oak-street Presbyterian Church. Elders, brethren from city churches and others. Elders, brethren from city churches and others to the number of about 150 gathered to witness the ceremony. At 3 o'clock the people raised their voices in the good old 100th Psalm, Mr. Wm. Crichton acting as precentor. Rev. Mr. Freeman read from the scriptures and Prof. Gregg offered prayer. Then the 67th Psalm was sung. The ceremony of laying the stone was performed by Pastor Cameron, when the coins of the realm, copies of the city papers and a record of the church's history were sealed down.

The record showed the history of the church from its inception as a mission in 1861. In 1865 a mission school was built. Mr. James Breckenridge was one of the active mission aries in the early years of the mission. In 1868 a site was purchased for a new church, and in 1869 the corner stone was laid. In 1871 the present pastor, Mr. Cameron, then a student at Knox College, commenced his labors there and has continued in charge ever since. Saturday's ceremony attests the success of his work during these years. After the stone was laid an adjournment was made to the Methodist Church at Oak and Parliament streets. Addresses were delivered by Rev. G. M. Milligan, Rev. De. Thomas, Rev. John Mutch, Rev. Alexander Gliray, Rev. A. C. Courtice and Mr. W. M. Clark.
