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PEPPER IN THE THOUSANDS

Official Figures and Their Lessons.
The last Gazette contains a mass of official figures that are too voluminous for publication in detail, but too interesting to be overlooked.

At the close of October last the total debt of the Dominion was \$27,781,000, being \$82,984 less than a month previous. While the debt was thus decreased last month, there had been spent in October on public works and lands \$234,243, which payments were on capital accounts; strong evidence of the fruitfulness and elasticity of the public revenue.

The total receipts from customs, excise, postoffice, railways, etc., in October were \$3,340,210, making a total for the year since June 30 of \$12,054,000, or \$1,100,000 more than the same date last year, \$8,028,054 on items charged to consolidated fund. The prospect is clear for such a substantial surplus at the end of the year as may lead to some fiscal changes if the present large receipts continue to be maintained.

Goods entered for consumption in September were valued at \$10,218,000, about the monthly average of 1890 and of 1891. The leading item of imports was "woolen manufactures," of which we imported \$1,250,730 worth in September, a very large item considering the advance being made by our native factories in this class of goods, and one that suggests that by further development of local wool we might supply our own market much more than we do with the more costly kinds of woolen goods.

The next large import item is "iron and steel and manufactures of," which reached \$846,500. This, too, might be largely reduced were the requisite capital and skill applied to the development of Canadian mining and allied industries. Of raw material we have unlimited supplies. What we need for turning into money, and for giving labor the capital to employ, is more enterprise in our wealthy men, and the extension of scientific knowledge regarding economic metallurgy, which would form a sound basis for the operations needed to make mining, smelting and allied work a more profitable industry.

Other import items are suggestive, but we pass them over at present. Although we are told by a Reform organ that we have no mines in Canada, we exported \$478,118 of "mineral products" in September; probably they were meteorites that dropped out of the sky. Fish exports were \$1,050,361, and forest products \$3,486,167; of the latter we shall soon have a larger portion for the supply of work to our own mills and people.

Our animals and their products were sold abroad to the value of \$4,008,859; of "agricultural products" \$3,318,484, so that the sales in foreign markets from farm products reached more than one-half of the total exports of the country during September. The shipment of manufactures was only \$740,810, a figure that might be enlarged greatly by the adoption of the same energetic, enterprising policy that has made the Old Land the workshop of the world.

The Postoffice Savings Banks on Sept. 30 held \$22,601,240 of deposits. They were increased that month by \$2,000,000. The amount returned as held by Dominion Government Savings Banks was \$17,173,185, of which Ontario had deposited \$2,025,000 and the Maritime Provinces \$15,248,900. This study of official figures does not reveal any trace of collapse in the commercial activity or the financial welfare of Canada. We are buying moderately, selling more goods than ever before, reducing our debt, while steadily increasing our savings; that we need as a people is more confidence, more self-respect and more wholesome contempt for those who are bent upon belittling and depreciating the country.
