French Gunboats tefused Entry to this Meinama River, 20 miles from the mouth of which Bangkok is letterable that the Siamese Government has refused to permit two more French, gunboats to enter the Meinam River, 20 miles from the mouth of which Bangkok is situated; and has threatened that if the gunboats attempt to cross the bar at the mouth of the river they will be sunk and France will be held officially responsible for beginning war upon Siam.

The French Gunboats Cross the Bar, London, July 13.—The Times correspondent in Bangkok telegraphs: "Despite the most pacific assurances from the french minister who understood to stop the advance of the gunboats and to equitably arrange all differences the Comete and Inconstante slipped across the bar this (Thursday) evening, and exchanged shots with the Packnam forts.

The two men-of-war then proceeded to Barkok, and now are anchored with the gunboat Lutin, opposite the British legation.
