It has been a dull, unsatisfactory day in stocks. The list started off slightly higher and looked as if it might hold firm, but speculation gave out and prices finally sagged considerably, closing in many cases at the lowest for the day. Cont nued reports of gold exports merely forbid investors taking on any important lines of stocks, but do not seem to cause any further weakness in the market. On the break of half point from present prices would buy dividend paying Grangers and would increase the line at every additional half point decline. Sugar got up to 101½, but lost ½ before the close. We believe it will go considerably lower, as covering only serves to put it up fractionally. Tobacco opened down from yesterday's strong closing and continued to decline most of the day, losing one point. Gas was the most active stock early and fell to 63%. We believe it is a purchase on this decline. Leather preferred has been weak all day and we would not be surprised to see it drop to 65 soon. St. Paul sold around 75 most of the ddy, but closed ¼ under. There was very little trading in R. I. and no material change in price. B. & Q. dropped to yesterday's low point, closing at 85%. We would buy all three of these stocks on any further weakness. W. U. lost 1½ from its highest point, closing weak on the bottom. Mo. P. also lost 1 point and looks like an excellent purchase. Would also buy Manhattan on weak spots, but are afraid of W. U.

It will hang over the market for another week, but it is doubtful if it will result in materially lower prices. The bearish effect has already been discounted and there is a very large outstanding short interest in antick-pation of a sharp break at the close of the month.

The belief is gaining ground that the New Yorkers who are long several millions of Dec. wheat may insist on the grain being delivered to them. This would leave us with very small holdings outside of the 10½ millions of winter wheat. The lowest prices on the crop were made to-day in wheat. This has encouraged shorts to increase their lines and undoubtedly many disgusted longs have let go. In the present temper of speculation somewhat lower prices may be seen temporarily, but wheat bought now will show good profits before long.

Heavy liquidation of long Dec. wheat was the feature of to-day's market. There was a great deal of changing of Dec. contract to May, but a great deal of Dec. wheat was over-boarded outright. Foreign markets were weak. The Price Current estimated the crop at 475,000,000 bushels, with a fair and constantly improving outlook for the growing crop. There was a collapse in Dec. wheat at St. Louis, more talk of gold exports and snow was predicted throughout the winter wheat belt. Exporters were quite liberal, 507,000 bushels. There was a good cash business, about 150,000 bushels red winter wheat being sold to interior millers or to go East.

Corn was lower. The cold weather and weakness of wheat induced general selling of small lots by commiss on firms, but there was a corresponding desire to cover shorts. Primary markets received 288,000 bushels, against 357,000 last year. Local receipts were 401 cars, the estimated withdrawals from store 100,000 bushels. Estimates for to-morrow 400 cars. Charters 80,000 bushels.

Cattle receipts at Chicago to-day, 10,000, were the only buyers of Jan. deliveries. including 1000 Texans and 1500 western; The public bought May futures moderately.
