Best of Harmony Exists at Meeting of Twin City A.A.A. Last Night

KITCHENER, Oct. 28.—The first annual meeting of the Kitchener and Waterloo Amateur Athletic Association was held in the city hall here this evening and was largely attended by the enthusiastic followers of sports in the two towns. The reports of the officers were of an encouraging order. It was reported that the association would be represented by senior and junior hockey teams in the O. H. A., and that the St. Mary's club would enter the intermediate league.

Schooners To Race To-Morrow

Esperanto Arrives at Halifax, Ready to Meet Canada's Delaware

HALIFAX, Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—The Esperanto, queen of the Gloucester fishing fleet, with the Union Jack flying at her forepeak, and the Stars and Stripes at her main, and with Captain Marty Welch at her helm, poked her nose through the haze off Chibucto Head shortly before 5 o'clock yesterday and headed up the harbor on the last leg of her 300-mile run for the honor of carrying the colors of the United States in the great international fisherman's cup series, which will be sailed off this port, commencing to-morrow, against the Canadian schooner Delaware, Captain Tom Himmelman, of Lunenburg. Mayor John S. Parker and members of the Halifax committee, boarded the Esperanto before the lines had been made fast and proceeded to do everything in their power to make Captain Welch and his company feel at home. The American captain, a Nova Scotian himself by birth, is delighted with the behavior of the Esperanto on the voyage up from Gloucester.

RESENT ORDER WHICH KEEPS UNVACCINATED AWAY FROM SCHOOL

BRANTFORD, Oct. 28.—At a meeting of the Brantford Anti-Compulsory Vaccination League held last night the action of the medical officer of health in prohibiting the attendance at the Major Ballachey School of unvaccinated children was under consideration. It was resolved to send a protest to the Board of Education and the Board of Health against what the league regards as an arbitrary and unnecessary proceeding and an unfair discrimination against the children of those parents who have conscientious objections to vaccination. In the event of such representations failing to receive satisfactory attention, it is probable a public meeting will be held at an early date to ventilate the grievance.

EXPLORERS START ON ANTARCTIC TRIP

NORFOLK, Vt., Oct. 28.—The Norwegian steamer Thor I, carrying the British imperial Antarctic expedition, under the command of John L. Cope, well known explorer, sailed yesterday after coaling here for the trip to the Shetland Islands, where the expedition will leave the vessel. The next stop of the Thor I will be at Montevideo, where two additional members of the party and dogs for the sledging work will be picked up.

P. E. I. ASKS REPEAL OF THE LUXURY ACT

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Oct. 28.—G. W. Taylor, deputy minister of inland revenue, and Joseph McDonald, inspector of the maritime provinces, held a conference with merchants yesterday on the working of the various excise acts. A resolution passed on Wednesday by the Retail Merchants' Association, asking for the repeal of what was termed the "so-called luxury act," was submitted to the deputy minister. He said it was not in his jurisdiction to deal with that, but he would submit it to the minister.

Only Few Westerners Adopt "Public-Be-Damned" Attitude.

WHEAT TO SOAR, ANYWAY

Head of Bureau Thinks It Will Go To \$4.

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—Shortage of the wheat crop and increased export are factors that will force an advance in prices, regardless of the success or failure of the first "wheat strike" in the history of the United States, according to J. S. Howard, head of the American Farm Bureau Federation, an organization representing 1,500,000 farmers throughout the United States.

The general sentiment among agriculturists is one of vigorous opposition to the "farmers' strike," according to Mr. Howard. He deprecated the action of "the few Western farmers who have assumed a 'public-be-damned' attitude and deliberately lost the moral support of the people."

Mr. Howard said the present price of wheat is much lower than actual crop conditions warrant, but prophesied that wheat prices are going to climb steadily and by next June will range between \$2 and \$4. He based the statement upon personal investigation of conditions and the best information from market experts, he said.

BLOCKADE FEARED IN THE BLACK SEA

Italian Ship Laden With Wheat For Russia Is Seized.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—British warships have taken to Batumi the Italian steamer Ancona, bound for Novorossiisk, with a cargo for Soviet Russia, says a Moscow dispatch to The Daily Herald, organ of Labor. It is claimed this action is a gross violation of the international law, there being no blockade of Black Sea ports at present.

HOG CHOLERA OUTBREAK IN BARTON TOWNSHIP

HAMILTON, Oct. 28.—Following an outbreak of hog cholera in Barton Township, Inspector W. G. McDonald, of the veterinary general's department, Ottawa, to-night ordered a quarantine of all hogs in the County of Wentworth, but more especially South Wentworth. Inspector McDonald left for Toronto to-night to obtain sufficient serum to inoculate every hog in the district. It is believed that the outbreak of the disease is due to a hog raiser of Barton Township, who recently lost eighty hogs, selling the young hogs that survived in the open market. This has resulted in the disease manifesting itself at many points over a wide center.

Several pens in Barton were inspected this afternoon by Inspector McDonald. The licenses of seven or eight hog raisers were cancelled as a result. Inspector McDonald shot several hogs and cancelled several licenses. Two-thirds of the marketable value of the hogs destroyed will be allowed to the owners. Inspector McDonald is credited with saying that while the cholera is of a mild type, and he believes it can be effectively checked by the speedy use of serum, the fact of many infected hogs being sold in the open market was a disturbing incident. Until the quarantine is lifted no hogs in Wentworth can be slaughtered or marketed.
