

G. Agnew, aged 35, of the Ontario reformatory, was struck on the head by a flying piece of rock from a quarry blast on the prison farm at moon to-day and died at 3 o'clock this afternoon in the hospital. His skull was fractured.

After the blast, on returning to the scene of operations, they found Mr. Agnew lying in the midst of broken rock, and saw at once that he had been struck.

SERVED OVERSEAS. Mr. Agnew was a married man, living with his wife in the lodge at the prison gates. His mother is still living in St. Marys. Other survivors are six brothers and one sister. Mr. Agnew had seen service overseas, having enfisted early in the war with the light artillery. on returning to Canada he occupied an official position in the Guelph Military Hospital, being in charge of the works department, where the returned soldiers were taught various industrial vocations. When the institution was turned back into a prison Mr. Agnew received the appointment of assistant to Superintendent Neelands.

Mrs. Agnew was in Toronto at the time of the accident, but in response to a message telling of her husband's injuries she left for Guelph immediately, and arrived at the hospital only a few minutes after Mr. Agnew's death.
