He helped to take eight persons out of a nearby building. A little boy and his mother were saved, the rest killed. Mr. James Hindson's beautiful house was in the storm centre and was completely wiped out. The family were all in the house at the time except Harry. Mr. wiped out. Fred being killed and Mr. Hindson caught in the ruins. The rest of the family got severely bruised. Mr. Wm. Hindson got off with about \$800.00 damage. 
