SPORTSMANSHIP (I)

To the Editor of the MONITOR

DEAR SIR—We have heard a great amount of talk during the past about clean sportsmanship and why certain teams in various towns were eliminated from taking part in the Valley or other league games of baseball.

We always admire every team that puts up first class baseball, winning or losing as the case may be providing the usual amount of arguing with the Umpire and between players is absent.

The latter part of the above statement we are sorry to state is in the majority of cases present, especially when one team is gaining ground upon the other, or if one smart fellow thinks he can carry a bluff.

We know of no team in the Valley League that has not practised this sort of thing. Who is the Umpire and what is he for?

Is he not in the field for a definite purpose or is he there to be dogged about by one or more who think they can play and umpire the game at the same time. Remember the umpire holds the most difficult and thankless position in the field and his decisions must be received as given.

Arguing on the field destroys the sport of this most popular of games and lowers the respect that baseball fans have hereto held towards the teams.

Speaking of sportsmanship and clean playing, brings us to another point and that is that teams or other managers should be men of their word.

I refer to the arrangements made with a certain Valley team by the Bridgetown management for Labor Day celebration in the latter town.

The necessary arrangements were completed that said team should

come to Bridgetown on above date playing one or two games with one of the fastest teams in the Maritime Provinces. The agreement was that the expenses of the team should be paid.

Arrangements were then completed with the G. W. V. A. of Halifax that their team should play this Valley team under similar conditions.

Later we learn that the valley team backs down on their agreement and calls for fifty dollars in addition to their expenses. The Valley team has fifteen miles to travel, the Halifax team one hundred or more and the latter team will not take more than their expenses.

We call these men sports, the Valley team from our sister town you may call anything you care to, but they certainly are not sports. Turn the table likewise upon them and hear the squeal.

We take it for granted because one or more men of this Valley team has recently received fifty dollars for a home run that they must be out of the ordinary—a class by themselves.

We are not squealing because of the payment of fifty dollars but we are just comparing sportsmen of one town with so called sportsmen of another.

We do not want such material as that in our future Leagues, for we are seeking men who can fairly call our "Brothers" in the game, without feeling that the other fellow is a mere grain of sand, a mere nothing, compared to us, the would be future winners of the "World Series".

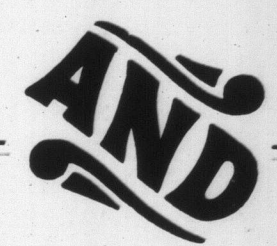
