agreeably to the wifhes of his empress; and that he could not fo entirely forget her character, or his own honour, as to barter for the performance of a duty. Among other things, he faid, he made a particular point of fetting a good example to the Kamtschadales, who were just emerging from a state of barbarism; that they confidered the Russians as their patterns, in every respect; and that he hoped they would, in future, think it a duty incumbent on them to render strangers every affistance in their power, and believe it to be the universal practice of all polished and civilized nations.

The Major having, fo far as he was capable, relieved our prefent diftreffes, he was not unmindful of our future wants; and, imagining we fhould not be able to difcover the paffage we were in fearch of, and that we fhould return to Kamtfchatka; he procured from Captain Clerke, the particulars of what flour and cordage he fhould want, promifing to fend them from Okotfk, to wait our arrival. He alfo prefented the Captain with a written paper, enjoining every Ruffian fubject to affift us to the utmoft of their abilities.
