Make a sauce from one cup of milk heated in a double boiler, one rounding tablespoonful of flour, and two rounding tablespoons of butter. Season with salt and white pepper and add one-quarter pound of grated cheese. When the cheese is melted, and it should not be added until the sauce has cooked five minutes, pour at once over the hot drained macaroni. Serve

## Religious Notes.

The Duke of Connaught presided over the annual meeting of the Royal Army Temperance Association, and mentioned that the abstainers in the Army at home and in India numbered 49,000. They recognized at the War Office the very important part which the Association had played in raising the tone of the British soldier and in preparing him for whatever employment he might get in af-ter-life. It was a source of great satisfaction to note the steady increase in sobriety which had taken place in the British Army. During his inspections he made inquiries as to the conduct of the men and was uniformly told that there was very little drinking, and in proof of this he was asked to see the canteen takings. Clare White, the secretary, had visited the South African garrisons in the interests of the Association. Lord Methuen mentioned that one battalion in his command had 210 total abstainers.
