

There have been during the past week slight signs of increased activity in the Produce Market, but, on the whole, the business done has been inconsiderable. The visible supply of wheat at all the usually mentioned points in the United States and Canada at the close of the year, was 10,800,000 bushels, against 11 340,000 at the close of 1870.
