Thus, when ten or more copies are ordered, a reduction of *Five Cents* per copy will be made, and every e'venth copy will go free as heretofore.—The Postage is in all cases paid at the Halifax Office.

This reduction in price is made with the earnest hope of securing a greatly increased circulation for the *Record*. As the official organ of the Church it ought to have a place in every family. There are few indeed but can spare 45 cents a year for a publication such as this. We know of no periodical containing an equal amount of reading that can be secured at so low a price. The letters of our Missionaries and the admirable Reports of our Boards would alone be worth a great deal more than the price asked for the *Record*.

We ask therefore the co-operation of Sessions and Presbyteries, and of public spirited members of the Church to aid in circulating the *Record* until its circulation is at least doubled. This year there was an increase of 500: next year this increase should be—might be—multiplied by ten.

Some Presbyteries, notably that of St.

John, call the attention of the people to the *Record* at Presbyterian Visitations. The effect is excellent, and we hope all our Presbyteries will follow the example of St. John, and with similar results.

We beg also respectfully to suggest to Ministers to call the attention of their congregations on the Lord's Day to the claims of the *Record*, and to recommend to their Sessions to take active part in circulating it among the people. A minister who has tried the plan in his own Congregation with remarkable success, suggests that ministers refer to leading articles and items of Church intelligence from the pulpit, especially at this time of the year, and in January. Also that Sessions appoint canvassers who shall call on every family. It has been found by experience that the canvassers are fond of their work, and that scarcely any family is too poor or too hard and careless to subscribe for the *Record*.

It is for the interest of the whole church that the *Record* should be widely circulated, so that all our people may have some idea of what the church is doing at home and abroad.

Orders should be in, if practicable, by the 20th December; and every order should be accompanied by the Money. Payment in advance is now more imperative than ever.

We need not say, what we hope is clear to all our readers, that the *Record* is edited with great care. We hope, however, to make it still more deserving of the approval of the Church, and still more useful. Nothing will aid us more effectually in this than a large increase in our circulation.
