FISHERIES ACT

MEASURE TO AMEND

The House resumed from Tuesday, December 11, consideration of the motion of Mr. Valcourt that Bill C-74, an act to amend the Fisheries Act and to amend the Criminal Code in consequence thereof, be read the third time and passed.

Mr. George Proud (Hillsborough): Madam Speaker, it is indeed a pleasure for me to rise and discuss Bill C-74. It is an honour to speak to it because it not only affects many of the residents of my riding of Hillsborough, but it affects all residents of Prince Edward Island and indeed many Canadians who are involved in the fishing industry.

The fishery has undergone a tremendous amount of change in the past number of years and I am sure that in years to come change will become a very integral part of this industry. Much of it has been and will continue to be painful. This fact is confirmed by various reports and recommendations such as the Kirby report, the Harris report and the Haché report. Members of this House and of the other place have also studied the fishery and have attempted to make recommendations to this government.

The major feature of the bill we are debating today is a response to some of these recommendations. It would impose a substantial increase in penalties for violations of fisheries law, such as illegal dumping, discarding or misreporting of fish, fishing in enclosed areas, or damaging fish habitat.

A study conducted by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans on the management of groundfish in the Scotia-Fundy region of the east coast, the Haché task force, revealed that the maximum fines provided for in the act
