My dear Wiggins:-Your very interesting letter to Sir Arthur Currie has been handed to me in his absence and I am taking this opportunity to reply to it meanwhile. I am quite sure that you realize as well as many others how much it does really concern us to see such an exodus from Canada to the United States. May I add, however, that in the Medical Faculty we are making every effort to keep them here, to develop Canadian doctors to remain on Canadian soil. We have recently obtained four scholarships for Canadian students, who, when they graduate, will be encouraged to remain, and we are trying to do our best to keep the pick of our graduates in Canada. The various points you mention might well be covered in annual talks to our students are well worthy of note, and for my own part in the Faculty of Medicine, I shall make use of them when the occasion arises next session. I know Sir Arthur will be delighted to hear of your continued interest in
