As for Sir John Pennington, Sir Henry Marom, and some other seamen who rose in this reign to be admirals, we meet with nothing relating to them of importance enough to deserve the attention of the reader, or which can any way tend to the enlightening this part of our history; and therefore we shall conclude our account of this reign, with a list of the ships added to the royal navy by King Charles I^d.
