## BARKER CHOSEN AS THIRD DEPUTY

Had More Votes Than All Four Other Candidates Combined.

## THANKED THE ELECTORS

Robert Barker was the choice of the electors of York Township for the third deputy reeve, rendered by the result of the election held on Tuesday last. Barker, who has been a resident of the township for many years, was elected by a large majority, his opponents altogether could only muster returns showing a plurality of 352. Lacey was very pleased with the result, which was a bye-election. He thought that had the election been held on the regular day, the result would have been totally different. Mr. Lacey will run again next year.

T. R. Wilcox said that the result was not surprising, as four out of the five candidates were new men. "I've heard hard to get to the head of the poll," said Mr. Wilcox. "I'm returning again next year for another try." He said that something would have to be done regarding sewers and water, as the township in the near future, referring to Detroit as supplying the suburbs for miles around with these necessities.
