Mr. Alan Martin (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Finance): 1. Data on provincial and municipal debt, by province, for the fiscal years 1970-71 to 1975-76 are available in the Statistics Canada publication Consolidated Government Finance, catalogue 68-202. Data on total debt outstanding of provinces and municipalities (no provincial detail) for calendar years 1961 to 1976 are available in Financial Flow Accounts, volume II, catalogue 13-563, data for 1976 (revised) and 1977 and available in catalogue 13-002.

UNINSURED LOSSES OF EQUIPMENT

Question No. 1,099-Mr. Clarke (Vancouver Quadra):

1. With reference to the uninsured losses of equipment in the Public Service Staff Relations Board detailed at page 9.60, Volume 1 of the 1977-78 Public Accounts of Canada, did the Board take steps to ascertain the present whereabouts of the missing electric typewriters and, if so (a) what were they (b) what was the result of the steps taken?

2. Was the thief apprehended?

3. On what date, in what locations and under what circumstances were the machines stolen?

4. Did the Board undertake procedural changes to ensure that such an incident does not recur and, if so, what were they?

Mr. Yvon Pinard (Parliamentary Secretary to Deputy Prime Minister and President of the Privy Council): 1. (a) The Public Service Staff Relations Board reported the thefts to the Ottawa Police for investigation as to the whereabouts of the missing electric typewriters.

(b) The result of the investigation was negative.

2. The thief was not apprehended.

3. Two electric typewriters were stolen from the fifth floor of L'Esplanade Laurier during silent hours (1600 September 13, 1977 to 0730 September 14, 1977). Two electric typewriters were stolen from the fifth floor of L'Esplanade Laurier during silent hours 1600 September 15, 1977 to 0730 September 16, 1977).

4. The following procedural changes were implemented to prevent recurrences:

(a) A security committee was established to review and implement improved security measures;

(b) the installation of dead-bolt locks in addition to existing locks on all access doors was undertaken to prevent recurrences;

(c) additional security guards were employed pending the implementation of improved security measures; and

(d) special doors were installed in stairwells to prevent unauthorized access to government occupied floors.
