## CRITICS SAY CLERICAL SUPPORT DID NOT COUNT

An Echo of the Celebrated Hanna-  
Pyne-Fallon Letter—New-  
comer Won Out.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—The committee  
which has in charge the conduct of the  
case against His Lordship Bishop M. F.  
Fallon, founded upon the now cele-  
brated Hanna-Payne-Fallon letter, are  
drawing some satisfaction from an in-  
cident which just transpired in Win-  
dward, and which they think will show  
Rome just how the wind blows.  
A contest for school trustee was re-  
cently held in the City of Windsor, in  
the parish over which Father Downey is  
the pastor. Father Downey is the  
priest whose church is virtually "boy-  
cotted" because of his failure to preach  
in French. There were two candidates.  
One of these, Neil Reaume, one of the  
best known men in Windsor, a busi-  
nessman and a member of one of the old-  
est families on the Detroit River, re-  
ceived the so-called "clerical support."  
All told, with the clerical support, he  
got 17 votes. His opponent, John  
Mousseau, a French Canadian, who came  
to the city the "anti-clerical" standard  
bearer, captured 24 votes.  
The critics of Bishop Fallon will en-  
joy the result. They say that the de-

clerical support is not a factor in the  
election of the people as a result of his  
recent newspaper campaign.

Farmer Sent to the Penitentiary for  
Two and a Half Years.

CORNWALL, Jan. 11.—(Special.)—  
The winter assizes closed here this eve-  
ning after a two days' sitting before  
Sir Glenholme Falconbridge, chief jus-  
tice. There were two civil and one  
criminal case on the docket. In the  
case of Joshua G. Fetterly of Matilda,  
charged with stealing about 60 bags of  
oats from a neighbor, the grand jury  
pleaded guilty after the grand jury  
had returned a true bill against him.  
He was sentenced to two and a half  
years in Kingston penitentiary.

## INCREASES THE DUTY

United States Will Be Asked to Re-  
move \$2.50 Fee on Shipments.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—There is talk in  
the capital of asking reciprocity with  
the United States on a point where  
none now exists.  
All shipments of goods from Canada  
to the United States of value of \$100  
or over must have attached to them a  
document that documents it is necessary  
to pay \$2.50, which is the duty on im-  
ports in the regular schedule of du-  
ties. There are no Canadian consuls  
in the United States, so there could  
not be any corresponding arrangement.

## British Trade.

The board of trade returns show that  
1910 was a record year for British trade,  
the figures exceeding even those of  
1907, which was a boom year.  
The imports in 1910 were \$678,440,734,  
or \$3,392,200,865, an increase of 558,735,  
216 (\$368,676,980) over 1909.  
The exports amounted to \$534,365,215,  
or \$2,671,829,473, an increase of \$64,840,  
749 (\$324,209,745).

## RAILWAY SEEKS CHARTERS

Toronto Interurban Would Build to  
Barrie.

Notices have been filed with the clerk  
of the Ontario Legislature by two more  
railway companies.  
The Toronto Interurban Company will  
ask for power to equip an electric line  
from Toronto to Barrie.  
The International Railway and the  
International Traction Railway will ask  
that the latter be empowered to ac-  
quire the rights of the former in On-  
tario.

## Ontario Bank Shareholders.

Ontario Bank shareholders have paid  
in under their double liability \$70,000  
in excess of the deficit and 11 contribu-  
tories have yet to be heard from. The  
surplus over liabilities will be refund-  
ed, and it is estimated that it will  
amount to about ten per cent.

## MANY PROTEST AGAINST A RECIPROcity TREATY

List Includes: Boards of Trade,  
Labor Council and Coal  
Companies.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—(Special.)—A  
supplementary return, tabled in the  
commons to-day at the request of Hon.  
George E. Foster, gives the details of  
the resolutions adverse to reciprocity  
with the United States, passed by  
boards of trade and other public bodies  
throughout the Dominion; also letters of  
protest which have been addressed to  
the minister of finance on the subject.

## YORK LOAN LIQUIDATION

Even at Moderate 5 Per Cent. Charge,  
Cost Will Exceed \$150,000.

At an estimated basis of five per cent,  
the cost of liquidation will require the  
payment of over \$150,000 to the National  
Trust Co. for winding up the York  
County Loan.  
The creditors numbered 129,000, and  
had they not been grouped and dealt  
with in a scientific way the costs would  
have been much greater.  
In the liquidation of a loan company  
costs reached 30 per cent.  
On that scale the York County Li-  
quidation charges would cost \$600,000, as the  
total aggregated \$2,000,000.
