## LAW BOOK FIRMS IN LEGAL BATTLE

Toronto Company Would Restrain Rival From Publishing Work and Also Collect Hundred Thousand.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 1 .- (Can. Press.)-An action of peculiar interest to all members of the legal profession is that of the Canada Law Book Co., Limited. of Toronto, against Butterworth & Co., Limited, of Winnipeg and London, Eng., for an injunction restraining the Butterworth Co. from selling in Canada or the United States, copies of a legal publication known as "The Laws of England," by the Harl of Halsbury. The Canada Law Book Co. also asks \$100,000 damages from the defendants. The motion for an interim injunction comes up on Wednesday of this week in the court of King's bench.

The Canada Law Book Co. claim that they were given a contract by the Butterworth Co. for the exclusive sale of the "Laws of England" in Canada and the United States for five years from the date of publication. The first volume was issued in 1907, and up to date there are 23 volumes published, with five to follow.

# TUBERCULOSIS SUNDAY HELD IN MANY TORONTO CHURCHES

Special Sermons Preached and Addresses Delivered by Prominent Speakers Who Appealed to the Sympathies of Those in Attendance and Asked For Support of Memorial Bylaw.

Testerday was tuberculosis Sunday in the ohurches of Ontario. The effort was not an appeal for money, but to the sympathies of those in attendance case was both preventible and cur-

The observance of Tuberculosis Sunday yesterday was under the auspices of the National Sanitarium Association, of which Lord Strathoons is president and Hon. J. M. Gibson vice-president.

It was initiated by a deputation from the association calling on the denominational ministerial association, the denominational ministerial association, the denominational ministerial association, the Roman Catholic dignitaries, and the Jewish rabbis. They all assented to place the facts of the white plague visitation before their people. The deputation making the request was composed of W. J. Gage, Hon. W. A. Charlton, W. P. Gundy and R. Dunbar.

The leaders in the campaign to stamp out tuberculosis in Ontario addressed a number of the congregations in addition to the ministers.

At Trinity Methodist Church yesterday morning, Hon. W. A. Charlton gave an impressive address. He quoted from the sayings of Jesus to show that both before and after His resurrection He gave sreat prominence to the importance of healing the slock. No disease of these days was more appalling than tuberculosis in Ontario.

#### **CREW TAKEN FROM** ITALY NOT INCLUDED SINKING STEAMER IN CONFERENCE PLAN

Thirty-one Men Were Rescued in Boats in Nick of Time and Taken to . Halifax.

HALIFAX, Dec 1.—(Can. Press.)—
The steamer River Meander, bound from New York to Mediterranean ports, was abandoned three hundred miles east of Halifax, where her crew was taffen off by the steamer Ikbal, bound from Newport to Liverpool. The River Meander, which was formerly the Bordistan, left New York last Tuesday. She ran into Thursday's northeast gale, which blew seventy miles an hour, and she sprang a leak. The water began pouring in, and in spite of all the pumps could do it gained fast. On Friday morning it was seen that she was settling and preparations were being made to get the boats out. Signals of distress were up, and these were observed by the Ikbal on Friday afternoon.
