MINIMUM SALARY OF \$750
FOR BAPTIST MINISTERS

Convention of Ontario and Quebec
Concluded—Deacon Graham's
Attack on Laurier.

Peterboro, Oct. 22.—(Special.)—The Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec concluded tonight. Rev. John Craig, returned missionary from India, gave a stirring address on foreign mission work.

On Thursday last, when western missions were under discussion, Deacon William Graham of Gilmour Memorial Church, Peterboro County, who is a Liberal and a staunch Orangeman, created some excitement by calling Sir Wilfrid Laurier traitor and a Jesuit. The deacon aroused the feelings of some of the more staid members of the convention, and several times since has tried to interrupt a fiery speech when the claims of the west were under discussion. He has been repressed many times.

Too Soon in Water.
This morning, when the report of the state of religion, presented by Rev. C. J. Cameron of Toronto, was under discussion, the deacon remarked that dancing, professing Christians, often got too soon into the water, and that a Baptist could get into such churches, the training that he received bore evidence of being defective.

This afternoon President Warren evidently speaking with the authority of the convention, took occasion to remark that the onslaught made by Deacon Graham on Sir Wilfrid Laurier was only the expression of a body, and I further regret that the convention has been used by a private member for giving utterance of a political character.

The deacon was not in the church when the president made this announcement.

Twelve Ordinances.
The report of the state of the work showed 12 ministers had been ordained during the year, seven of whom had attended McMaster University. There had been 113 changes in the pastorates as compared with 119 of last year. The average length of pastorates had been about three years. Eight churches had been organized, and 20 churches edifices had been erected. The numerical statistics showed that 2098 baptisms had taken place during the year, as against 2822 of last year; the net gain in membership was 1741; the net loss 107; the net gain 1634. During the past five years 15,317 baptisms had been made. About one-half of the baptisms had been made on home missions fields, and one-half from the Sunday schools. During the year the churches expended \$466,724, as against \$408,918 last year; \$30,051 on work abroad, as against \$13,234 last year. The total expenditure at home and abroad was \$496,775, as against \$442,152 of a year ago. The average giving per member for work at home was \$8.61, as compared with \$8.58 last year, and \$1.90 for work abroad, compared with \$1.79, or a total giving per member of \$10.51, an increase of six cents on last year. During the past five years for work at home, the denomination raised \$1,849,784; for work abroad \$281,816, a total of \$2,131,600, as against \$2,250,522. The past financial year was the finest in the history.

Salaries of Pastors.
Rev. J. B. Kennedy, M.A., offered a resolution regarding the salaries of pastors. Forty per cent. of the churches had made no increase in pastors' salaries during the past five years. He believed there was a close connection between the smallness of the salary and the constant change in the pastorate. The resolution respectfully asked the churches to provide for their ministers a salary of at least \$750 per year, and that of raising of this should take the first place in their financial efforts. Mr. Kennedy said that churches gave contributions to missions and McMaster University and left the pastors' salaries unpaid. Denominational representatives should insist that the churches should pay the pastor first, before they gave to other objects. Mr. Kennedy moved his resolution regarding pastors' salaries. It was seconded by Mr. Moyle of Toronto.

It was moved in amendment that the motion be deferred until the convention's next year. Mr. Kennedy's resolution was carried by a majority of 8-1.

Foreign Missions.
The report of the foreign mission board showed that the total receipts for the past year were \$467,649, and disbursements of \$52,427.40. It was decided to raise \$53,000 next year for foreign missions. The place of meeting for the convention next year was left in the hands of the executive. It is probable the gathering will be held at Woodstock.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

WILL COMPLAIN TO BOARD
OF OVERCROWDING OF CARS

Board of Works in Sympathy With
Cheap Power Movement—Domestic Science Classes.

Hamilton, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—The board of works this evening decided to go after the Street Railway on still another tack. Ald. Stewart brought up the matter of the overcrowding of the cars during the evening between 6 and 7 o'clock, and he said that people often had to stand on the corners while three or four crowded cars passed before they could secure a car. It was agreed that the complaint should be made to the Ontario railway and municipal board.

City's Power Needs.
A majority of the members of the board expressed sympathy with the cheap power movement amongst the western municipalities, and the secretary was instructed to secure an estimate of the amount of power the city and other power-users would need, with a view of making an application for power. Stewart & Findlay said the city would save about \$1000 a year if the waterworks pumps were operated with electricity, and that it could save \$30,000 on the cost of the new pumps that will have to be bought soon.

The residents of the west end asked the board to prevent Edward New from blasting in his quarry, and the city solicitor was instructed to affect to the matter. It is proposed to install most of the 550 boulevard lamps west of Queen-street, but the exact location will not be decided until the aldermen have time to consider the subject further.

The Street Railway will be asked to double track Aberdeen-avenue, west of Queen-street, and to extend its Lockport tracks to Aberdeen-avenue.

Domestic Science Classes.
A sub-committee of the board of education met Inspector Leake this afternoon, and he advised them to start domestic science classes in the city. To place all the classes under the supervision of one teacher. He said that the government would contribute \$3000 to the cost of starting the classes, and make a yearly grant of \$200 to each class, so that the cost to the board would be practically nil. The trustees will recommend the board to adopt the inspector's recommendation to start new centres. The inspector thought they should also introduce manual training, but the trustees told him that they were not authorized to consider that subject.

Force to Make It Move.
Mr. Ryan was asked when he based his theories. He countered questioned: "On what proven facts do astronomers and other scientists base their present day theories? I have as much right to put forth a theory as they have. I have studied the sciences, and I contend that the world is on a solid foundation. If it is moving there must be a force to make it move. Then that force should be the force of gravity, and that would be the force of gravity outside the earth. Therefore, the force of gravity outside the earth would be greater than the force inside the earth. Astronomers tell us a point in the equator is revolving at the rate of seventeen miles a minute, but that we are going so fast that we don't appreciate it, or are not sensible of it. They tell us that we are kept on the earth by the force of gravitation. If a man is standing on the equator, could he be held there by force of gravitation if there was a greater force of gravity outside the earth? We are also told that the reason we do not feel ourselves passing thru space is because the atmosphere is carried around with the earth. If you go up a few thousand feet in a balloon where the centrifugal force of the earth would have no effect on the atmosphere, you need only wait there until New York came around to you and then descend."

Foundations at Poles.
"Giving astronomers the advantage of arguments that we are held on this earth by the force of gravity, the centrifugal force of the earth would yet be much greater and we would be thrown at once into space."

"The foundations of the earth, I contend, are situated at the north and south poles. Nature has never allowed us finally to explore these regions. The first person that comes within range with a telescope will see the solid foundations. It may perhaps be a foundation of rock, and if followed up it can also easily be shown that the centrifugal force of the earth does not carry round the atmosphere with it, as the wind blows in all directions. "If the earth revolves, it is absolutely certain that there is a force which makes it revolve."

WAVE SWEEPS DECK.
British Steamer With Cavalry Horses Buffeted by Storm.

Havana, Oct. 23.—The British steamer Kanawha, Captain McEwell, which left Newport News Oct. 16 for this port with 600 horses of the 11th Cavalry on board, has arrived here after having suffered severely in the recent cyclone.

One hundred and twelve horses were lost. Twelve were swept overboard by a tidal wave off Savannah, and the remainder were lost during the cyclone. The steamer sustained damage to her superstructure, and had her forecastle carried away.
