JUST IN ENGLISH DEB'T TO ENGLISH

President Roosevelt's Tribute to Cavaliers and Puritans—How to Deal With Corporate Oppressors.

NORFOLK, Va., April 26.—The Jamestown Tercentenary Exposition—a land and water display such as never before was attempted in this country or on foreign shores—was opened to-day with that pomp and ceremony which always attend an event where the president of the United States is a central figure.

President Roosevelt reviewed from the deck of the yacht-cruiser Mayflower the war vessels anchored in Hampton roads.

The first of the British ships encountered was the Roxborough, then the Hampshire and next the Argyll. President Roosevelt was especially interested in the flagship Good Hope, and exchanged personal salutes with Admiral Neville, who stood on the bridge.

The Good Hope, together with the German Imperial flagship Room, were assigned berths to the right and left of the Connecticut. These three flagships formed a triangle, where the Mayflower, at the end of the review dropped anchor.

President Roosevelt had just been introduced when the disorder and unrest in the crowd reached its height, and the civil guards in front of the grand stand seemed about to be swept from their posts.

President Roosevelt was especially interested in the flagships Good Hope, and exchanged personal salutes with Admiral Neville, who stood on the bridge.

In his address at the opening ceremonies President Roosevelt said he wished to say a word of special greeting to the representatives of the British governments present, and continued:

"I have come to assist you in celebrating what was in very truth the birthday of this nation, whose growth from their own loins and by the aid of the people of Great Britain abroad, was to make the people which one hundred and sixty-nine years later, assumed the solemn responsibilities and weighty duties of complete independence.

"In welcoming all of you I must say a special word to the representatives of the people of Great Britain and Ireland. The fact that so many of our people, of whom as it happens some are here, have their roots in the soil of your islands, is a fact which we value highly.

"Let me to the representatives of the people of continental Europe. From almost every nation of Europe we have drawn some part of our blood, some part of our traits. This mixture of blood has gone on from the beginning, and with it has gone on a kind of development unexampled in the history of any other people.

"Again, let me bid you welcome, representatives of the sister republics of this continent. In the larger aspect your interests and ours are identical. Your problems and ours are in large part the same, and as we strive to settle them, I pledge you herewith on the part of this nation the heartiest friendship and good will of the United States.

"Finally, let me say a special word of greeting to those representatives of Asiatic nations who make up that newest part of our people, the most ancient, the east of time immemorial. In particular, let me express a word of hearty welcome to the representative of the mighty island empire of Japan; that empire, which, in learning from the west, has shown that it had so much, so very much, to teach the west in return.

"To all of you here gathered, I express my thanks for your coming, and I trust that you will have a most profitable and enjoyable session for the welfare of your several nations. The world has moved so far that it is no longer necessary to be thrusting another down. All far-sighted statesmen, all true patriots, now earnestly wish that the leading nations should be able to get along together in peace and friendship.

SHOULD SUCH CASES GO TO THE PRIVY COUNCIL
