How Hon, Mr. Chamberlain's Plan For

IS NOW VIEWED IN GREAT BRITAIN.

He Has Sown Seed Which Will Soon be Scattered Broadcast.

Binding the Colonies to the Mother Country by Bonds Stronger Than Sentiment-How the Liberal Organs Criticise the Imperial Union Idea-A Carteen That Strikes the Key.

New York, June 14.-In his weekly special from London to The Tribune Mr. Isaac N. Ford says: Free trade hostility to McKinley will be embittered by the knowledge that Mr. Chamberlain has dealt Cobdenism a stagger-ing blow in his proposals for an Imperial Zollverein. Mr. Asquith lost no time in condemning the plan of a cus-toms union, with free trade within and protection without the Empire, as unsound in principle, unworkable in practice and as chimerical as ideal; and the Liberal press generally has dencunced Mr. Chamberlain as a protectionist playing with fire. Mr. Asquith was even so frantic as to predict the ruin of the colonial manufacturers if his zollverein system were adopted. This was hardly logical from Cobden's point of view, for Mr. Chamberlain merely purposes to subject colonial manufacturers to that unrestricted competition with British manufacturcompetition with Sritish Maintactures which free traders have always affected to consider helpful and invigorating and by no means destructive to foreigners. The Liberal press finds a more adroit argument against the scheme in the increased cost of living in England which would follow the Imposition of duties upon and American and Russian corn. The Congress of Chambers of Commerce found it impracticable to agree upon any precise project for a zoliverein, and ended by adopting a compromise resolution in favor of an Imperial Council for discussing the whole subject.

Chamberlain Mas Sown Seed.

The Turkish Authorities Are Also Adopting Assassination to Get Rid of Armenian Agitators,

Constantinople, June 14.—The representative of the United Press is informed on reliable authority that 600 Armenians have been arrested in this city since June 9. A majority of the prisoners are from Rodosto. The members of the Armenian Revolutionary Committee, who on Monday hast assassinated an Armenian spy in this city, and who was shot and killed by the patrol while trying to escape, was a native of Rodosto. Two hundred of the prisoners were shipped to Anatolia yesterday. The Government is using the occasion of the assassination to expel possible agitators.
